Home Visit.

Mrs. Jaap's father has recently suffered a stroke and he has quite severe loss of memory.

Mrs. Jaap felt that they had been having problems with William for some time but insisted that these were all (a) related to only William's behaviour and (b) him associating with bad company.

17.6.82

Home Visit. All family members seen except the youngest. William has apparently been reminding everyone I was coming tonight. Mr. Jaap was reluctant to discuss anything at all, just kept saying William would behave himself from now on.

The family mentioned that in order for William to get to school in time he leaves the house at 7.45 a.m. However he waits for a friend and he sometimes keeps him late!

kids all going to Jumble Sale tonight.

Interview interrupted by Police who had come to charge William with theft of a bike, however when they heard his story went off to look someone else first.

If I hadn't been there I suspect Mr. Jaap would have given William a good thumping without waiting to hear his story!

Arranged to visit next week.

Summary to December 1982

Billy appeared before a Hearing on 4th October and was placed on Supervision. Prior to this discussions between family, myself and Brother Cuthbert re possibility of Billy going to Brother Cuthbert's - agreed that if Billy's school attendance didn't improve we would consider this move.

During end of September, beginning of October Billy was suspended from Rosehall on four occasions, on last of these he was suspended before he got out of headmaster's room! After much pushing, family did arrange school transfer to Coatbridge High, to give Billy a fresh start at school.

suspended I attended with Mr. Jaap and Billy. The initial incidents tend to be trivial e.g. giving cheek to a teacher, but compounded by failure to do punishment exercises which were doubled, etc. Guidance Teacher, Joe Lopuski has tried hard with Billy but now appears to be having little effect and getting frustrated by this. Once in the treadmill of suspension it is likely that Billy will end up with expulsion. In the latter part of the term I am sure the school actually didn't suspend Billy but just sent him home. Mr. Bailey contacted me on one occasion after an interview with Billy regarding persistent late-coming in the morning where Billy had blamed his mum being drunk. Mr. Bailey was being very sympathetic to Billy but in fact Billy leaves home in plenty of time and meanders up the road at his own pace. He is becoming cheekier to staff, on one occasion he was pulled up for a fight with another pupil, his coming in late, occasionally taking afternoons off. He is still behaving quite well in individual classes but out of class he is difficult, failing to do punishment exercises, much the same pattern as Rosehall. It is possible that if he is able to continue at school next term that this fresh start could happen again but it is doubtful.

His behaviour at home continues to be erratic but no real change. I continued to see Billy twice a week during this period but the initial reason for this approach i.e. to build on and encourage re school performance and to provide the interest not shown by the parents, becomes less viable as his relationship with school becomes more erratic.

It is Mr. Jaap who negotiates with the school and any time I have asked both parents to come to the office only Mr. Jaap does, usually with an excuse that Mrs. Jaap is ill.

Not looking very hopeful at present.

July 1983

School holidays began well, Billy getting on all right at home although out a lot and not always in for meals. Playing about with his wee brother making "dens" in various places. He seems to have few pals to call on anymore, rather picks up now and again

Second week of holidays, Billy got acid in his eye for a battery he had found, however his sight is unimpaired.

Billy went missing from home on Wednesday, 13th July and remained away until found by Police on Saturday, 16th July. He seems to have been playing around in Coatbridge and says he spent one night sleeping out behind the Hebron hall and the other at a pal's house having told the

mother that he had his parents' permission. He had stayed out until 11 p.m. on the Tuesday night and was told he wasn't to get out the next day and he had climbed out the bathroom window. Was behaving himself okay at home and parents quite happy with him then on 20th July he went out to play and didn't return home. He was found in Helensburgh on 23rd July After his return home Police called regarding two charges; 1. theft from electricity meter, and 2. selling stolen tent, chairs, etc in Helensburgh. Billy has not yet been interviewed by the Police regarding these offences and mother says that she has a witness that he was not involved in the first of these charges

After both these spells away from home, father gave Billy a "leathering" Billy again went missing from 2 p.m. on Tuesday, 26th July until found by the Police at 1 a.m. in Main Street. Mr. Jaap again gave him a "leathering" and Mrs. Jaap informed me that she had tied Billy's hands and feet to stop him getting out again. When I visited the home on 27th July I examined Billy and there was no evidence of bruising or any other kind of injury. He himself appeared quite bright and cheerful and chatting away quite merrily with his parents. As it was felt at this time that the length that the parents appeared to be going to to ensure even minimal control over Billy were excessive, the options open to us were carefully looked at. These seemed to be:

1. an emergency Hearing or at least the annual Review Hearing brought forward to as soon as possible.
2. a Place of Safety Order on the grounds of lack of parental care.
3. a Section 15 admission and
4. leaving Billy at home.

On 1. the earliest Hearing available was 16th August; on 2. the Reporter felt that there were not sufficient grounds for a Place of Safety Order to go through; on 3. admission to Calder House not possible on a Section 15 as all Section 15s have to go through the admissions team and there is no meeting for eight days. As statutory instruments appeared not to be available to us, it depended on parents' willingness to agree to Section 15 admission to a Children's Home. Parents were not willing for Billy to be admitted to care at present and would rather wait for the Hearing on 16th August. If admission to Calder House for assessment is to be sought, new grounds of referral require to be established and while Billy may eventually be charged with the two offences mentioned above, these are unlikely to be through by 16th August. The new grounds of referral would require to be Being Outwith Parental Control, and the Jaap family have been informed of this and will consider writing a letter to the Reporter to the effect that Billy is outwith their control.

Billy therefore remains at home meanwhile, parents will contact if

situation gets more out of hand or if requesting Section 15 admission. It remains to be seen whether or not they will actually write the required letter to the Reporter.

I consider that asking for assessment at Calder House is the most appropriate course of action for the moment.

On 4. -

- i) A legitimate break for Billy from the family.
- ii) It seems likely that Billy will require residential care, even before the latest episode it was looking as if it was only a matter of time before school went out of control. If school for Billy goes out of control then this is likely to spill over to him becoming more and more difficult at home and residential care being necessary. What kind of residential care, however, is not clear as Billy is not in trouble with the Police as a rule and List 'D' school would seem, therefore, not to be appropriate. However, I don't know if he could manage a Children's Home, at least one of the local ones as I doubt that they would have sufficient structure for control to be able to cope with Billy. A period in Calder House might be able to tell us whether in fact he could cope with a Children's Home or not.

Billy himself seems resigned to Residential care, "I am going away anyway", says that he doesn't care. He didn't enjoy himself when away from home but just didn't want to go back home. Billy can be laughing and joking one minute and very aggressive the next if he is at all pushed. It does seem that he often switches off and doesn't care what happens to him.

Transfer Summary

Billy on Home Supervision from October 1982, grounds of referral Theft by Finding. Prior to this, concern from Rosehall High school on many counts (see initial referral letter).

Home Situation

Mother very heavy drinker, father tries but is weak. They live in grandfather's house, grandfather has had a stroke and needs alot of attention. Family now saving up Attendance Allowance to, hopefully, clear off their own arrears for the time they will need tenancy again. When drunk, mother is very aggressive to Billy and his father and wants Billy away from home.

School:

Deteriorated a lot in May and June, suspended on a few occasions. Not a lot of truancy but late coming, aggressiveness, failing to do punishment exercises. If he continues the same way next term, school will soon say they can't cope.

Billy:

Billy can be a very charming and likeable boy. I think he is probably quite bright and can show himself as being reasonably good at school work although his ability at school is obviously damaged by his home climate and his own emotional immaturity. He is keenly aware that his mother says regularly that she is fed up with him and he feels that she doesn't want him. His relationship with his father is quite good and Mr. Jaap shows a lot of interest in Billy, however he is really unable to compensate for the chaos which results at home from mother's drinking and he is really not in control. When pushed, Billy can be very sullen and aggressive and very difficult to get through to at these times. Billy has a lot of difficulty relating to boys of his own age and tends to eventually graduate towards younger children. At school he tends to annoy other children and while initially at Coatbridge High he seemed to be making good friends, [REDACTED] he does seem unable to sustain relationships of any length of time with children of his own age. I had hoped that a period of intermediate treatment might help this and an application has been made for Billy although I have had no word about it.

It seems likely that at Billy's Review Hearing on 16th August the parents will indicate that Billy is outwith their control even if they have not formerly written to the Reporter providing the new grounds of referral. However, depending on how Billy has been over the next fortnight, Father may say that he would like another chance with Billy. A period of assessment at Calder House would seem to me to be the most appropriate move at this point, however this may not be possible as there may not be new grounds of referral which would make this realistic. The other reasonable alternative would seem to be either a Children's Home or perhaps just possible, Bonnyhill still at this stage if they would accept Billy.

- 9.7.83 Discussed with H. Matheson the transfer of this case and agreed to accompany her to medical as the decision had been made to take Billy into care under Section 15. New grounds of referral will be drawn up by the Reporter as Billy's father has referred him as being outwith parental control. A Panel has been arranged for Billy for 16th August with the recommendation that he be placed in Calder House for assessment.
- 1.8.83 Billy was placed in Bellshill Children's Home on Friday, 29th July. He seems to have settled reasonably well and staff have noticed no adverse reactions. Mum and dad have visited every day since Billy was admitted. Billy was less than talkative and it was agreed to see him on Wednesday. Telephone call - Phoned Mrs. Jaap and confirmed that I would be the new Social Worker involved in the case.
- 5.8.83 Visit Bellshill Children's Home Took Billy out of the home and went for a walk in Strathclyde Park. Discussed with him his likes and dislikes. Gradually we worked round to why he had been staying away from home. It would appear to boil down to his relationship with his mother. He would seem to have a great dislike for her and claimed that she felt the same way about him. He stated that his mother was always drunk and did absolutely nothing in the home. Billy would seem to be enjoying the novelty of being away from home and is enjoying being spoiled by his Key Worker.
- 8.8.83 Telephone call - Mrs. Jaap phoned to ask if it would be alright for them to call and take Billy out for the day as they have hired a car for the week. Advised that it may be best to give Billy some time to settle.
- 9.8.83 Home Visit Children's Home Billy had gone swimming.
- 10.8.83 Home Visit Children's Home Mr. Jaap and Billy's younger brother and sister were there. Billy is really enjoying himself and is really finding himself the centre of attraction. Staff in the Home have however seen the other side of Billy and he has displayed some temper tantrums and threatened to run away when things have not been going his

way.

12.8.83 Home Visit

The fact that Billy is away from home would seem to have eased the pressure on Mrs. Jaap and she is beginning to speak in positive terms about Billy. Advised them of the Hearing on 16th August and that it was likely that Billy would be going to Calder House for a period of assessment.

15.8.83 Home Visit Children's Home

Billy reasonably cheerful. He was out for a run with his mum and dad in their red car last night and spoke of being to see a film with his key worker and said that he was going swimming every day.

Told Billy that after his Hearing that it would be likely that he would be going to Calder House.

6.8.83 Panel decided to send Billy to Calder House for a period of assessment as from 18th August.

Phoned Calder House to confirm place.

8.8.83 Accompanied Billy, mum and dad to Calder House. Billy was obviously very nervous and tried to hide this by telling silly little jokes.

2.8.83 Advised by Calder House that Billy's assessment would take place on 6th September.

4.8.83 Visit to Calder House

Billy would have appeared to have settled in reasonably well. He is receiving regular visits and is enjoying being the centre of attraction. He knows a boy and girl who were already in Calder House and claims to be getting on very well.

0.8.83 Home Visit

Discussed the forthcoming assessment. Mr. and Mrs. Jaap spoke of the possibility of Billy coming home. They feel that the last few weeks have allowed them and Billy some breathing space.

September

The assessment meeting at Calder House decided that Billy should return home with the

suggestion that the family attend the Department of Child and Family Psychiatry.

The assessment took place on 6th September and as Billy's Hearing was not until 13th, arrangements were made to have him re-admitted to a Children's Home ^{IN THE EVENT} ~~ADMITTED~~ ^{OF} a breakdown in relationships at home.

The intervening period between the Hearing on 13th September proved quite successful and no problems were apparent. The Panel decided to continue Billy's Home Supervision with the stipulation that he attend the Department of Child and Family Psychiatry.

Arranged first appointment with [REDACTED] and saw Billy in office interviews and in home visits. Billy settled back into school and right until the end of September no problems were apparent. Billy however failed to come to the office and a home visit revealed that he had stayed outwith the house on Sunday, 25th September. Apparently Billy had stolen a cassette from Woolworths on the Friday and his father had punished him and kept him at home.

According to Mr. and Mrs. Jaap there had been no problems at home which might have accounted for Billy's actions. Billy could not offer any explanation for his behaviour either. Advised Billy that he could not continue to stay away from home without permission.

At school Billy has had one minor confrontation but his Guidance Teacher, Mr. Lipowski did not make a great issue of it. On the whole Billy has been doing quite well at school.

October

It has become obvious that there are some problems at home. Mrs. Jaap has failed to come to appointments with [REDACTED] and Billy is again showing great resentment for his mother. He claims she is drinking and that she constantly gets on to him. Attempts to discuss this with Mrs. Jaap have been met with denial and she claims that she has tried to improve her relationship with him.

Billy failed to keep his appointment on 18th October. On making a home visit it was discovered that Billy had not been home since leaving to go to school on Friday, 14th October. Mr. Jaap had not yet contacted the Police and was not aware of where Billy was.

Informed Mr. Jaap that the Police would be contacted immediately. The Police traced Billy to the [REDACTED] and he was returned home that evening.

Billy would again appear to be outwith parental control and it was decided to call a Review. Billy can offer no real reason for staying away from home but it would appear that his relationship with his mother has reached a new low. He is now

saying we can do what we like with him as he does not care what happens to him.

It would now seem that the most appropriate place for Billy would be in a List 'D' School. [REDACTED]

Billy stayed outwith the home again on Friday, 21st October and refuses to say where he stayed. Mr. Jaap again failed to notify the Police. He was ~~warned~~^{warned} that he would have to do so in future even if Billy was not home by a reasonable hour.

A Panel has been arranged for 1st November.

G. Moncrieff 27/10/83.

OCTOBER

Panel imposed a residential supervision requirement when Billy appeared before them on 1st November. He did not seem disturbed by the decision and may actually have felt some relief.

[REDACTED] were advised of the decision and a pre-admission visit arranged for 8th November. [REDACTED] Child Family Psychiatry advised and appointment made for Billy and his parents.

Billy was eventually admitted to Dr. Lythnes on 14th November and the period leading up to this would appear to have been his most settled period within the home for a considerable time.

He settled well in Dr. Lythnes and was allowed home for one night at the first weekend. Initially weekend leave presented no problems and Mr and Mrs Jaap seemed quite happy. They reported that Billy's relationship with his mother would seem to have improved in that they had no arguments. Again impressed on Mr Jaap that he should enquire about his past visit records.

DECEMBER

Billy's first weekend home in December proved quite successful. During the following weekend his father accused him of having stolen a cassette tape from Woolworths. As usual Billy denied this and returned to Dr Lythnes in

a bad mood.

Informed by Dr. Guthrie on 12th December that Billy had absconded at 11AM that morning. Advised Mr & Mrs Joop and police were informed. Billy was returned by the Edinburgh police on the following day having been picked up in Waverly Station. Dr Guthrie failed to notify the writer, Mr & Mrs Joop or Leathbridge Police. It was only discovered that Billy had been returned when an enquiry was made with the School on 15th December.

Billy was not allowed weekend leave the next weekend but would be allowed Christmas leave. As this would be a lengthy period at home tried to impress on Mr & Mrs Joop the possibility of difficulties arising and the need to remain calm.

Billy arrived home for leave on 23rd December with presents for all of the family. Wished him a happy Christmas and arranged to see him on 28th. Billy failed to keep his appointment. On visiting the home the following day Mr Joop advised that Billy had left home at 10AM the previous morning. The police had been informed when he did not return by midnight. Advised Dr Guthrie of the situation. Billy is not due to return until 4th January. Message received from Mr. Joop on 30th December that Billy had returned home the previous evening at 9pm. Confirmed that he had advised Dr Guthrie and it was decided that Billy should remain at home for the remainder of his holidays and a Review to be held at Dr Guthrie's early in the new year.

JANUARY '84

Billy returned to Dr. Guthrie on 4th January and according to his parents there were no further problems during the holiday period. The only explanation they could offer for Billy's running away from home was an argument with his mother. He had refused to say where he had spent the night. Review arranged with Dr. Guthrie for 25th January.

Billy has a new Key Worker at Dr Lythnes, John Taylor. At the internal review in Dr Lythnes various issues were discussed. All of the previous problems remain. Mrs Joop would appear to be still drinking, no attempt has been made to tackle rent arrears. Billy has no intention to go home as his relationship with his mother remains poor. It was decided that home contact was essential and it was decided to increase Billy's weekend leave by one day. He will now return home on Sundays. Billy would appear to be settling quite well within the school after a difficult beginning. It was decided that some further input from [REDACTED] may be of benefit to the family and it was agreed to contact her.

FEBRUARY

Appointment arranged with [REDACTED] for the beginning of the month. Discussion centred around Billy's weekend leave and his relationship with his mother in particular.

Throughout February Billy's weekend leaves appeared to be satisfactory and no problems were reported from the parents or Dr Lythnes.

Visit made to Dr Lythnes with parents and meeting with parents staff and Billy. Concentrated on relationships and the fact that Mr Joop had made no effort to find out about rent arrears in previous home.

MARCH

Weekend leave continued to be quite successful with Billy and Mr Joop appearing to get by without too many disagreements. Mrs Joop feels that Billy is now less likely to explode over a minor issue and describes him as being no problem and ever helpful when at home.

Mr + Mrs Joop had been encouraged to visit Dr Lythnes on their own. Whilst Mr Joop was visiting Billy on 27th March Mr Wotherspoon (Grandfather) died. Billy returned home with his father and remained until the weekend.

Billy again absconded on 2nd April. He returned on his own the following evening and claimed that he had walked to the Forth Bridge and spent the night in a shed. It was felt that this absconding had been due to the death of his grandfather and that he possibly needed some time out. Significantly however Billy made no attempt to return home.

Billy was due to be on holiday from 6th - 16th April but remained in Dr Guthrie's until an emergency Review was held on 9th April

Saw Billy on 13th and he appeared to be enjoying his holiday. He claimed that he was getting on well with his mother and that there were no problems.

The remainder of Billy's holidays appeared to present no problems. During the Easter weekend Billy was accused of breaking into the gas meter. He denied this however. On returning to Dr. Guthrie's he refused to accept weekend leave. His parents insist that he was the only one who could have broken into the meter. Fortunately the meter had recently been emptied and there was only just of £1 in it.

As Billy was refusing to return home a further review was called for 1st May.

Both parents attended Review in Dr. Guthrie. Billy insisted that he was not going to return home as his parents still insisted that he was responsible for breaking open the gas meter. Mr & Mrs Toop agreed that the matter was over and done with and could now be forgotten about. There continued to be heated exchanges between Billy and his mother in particular.

Billy was taken out and calmed down by Mr McCabe Senior House Master and eventually agreed that he would return home the next weekend. It was agreed that no further mention would be made of the meter incident and that Mr Toop would take immediate steps to secure housing as this was an area of concern for Billy.

Billy returned home on weekend leave on 14th May. According to his parents he watched television and went out for a short time on Friday night. He went out very early on Saturday morning and did not return until everyone was in bed. Mr Toop looked in and saw he was sleeping on Sunday morning. Billy rose and went out again and when he did not return in the afternoon to go back to Dr. Guthrie, Mr Toop notified them. The police were later notified.

Billy was not found by the police until the early hours of Tuesday 15th May. Stand-by placed him in St Philip's H.O. overnight and he was returned to Dr Guthrie in the morning. He will not be allowed leave for a few weeks. As yet he has given no reason for running away and his parents do not seem to know why. He has apparently been charged with housebreaking.

Billy refused to return home until 8th June and even then reluctantly. The weekend leave was not entirely successful but did not result in his running away and he returned to Lythross on time.

It is becoming increasingly clear that Lythross may not now be the most suitable placement for Billy and that a move to a school nearer Leathbridge may be appropriate. At a Review held in Dr Lythross on 13th June it was agreed that a place should be sought for Billy nearer to Leathbridge. The only two schools available are Leathbridge West D³ but Mr & Mrs Toop have no objection to their son attending either St Philips or St John's Springborg. Advised that St John's may be the most appropriate but that Billy may be slightly young.

Mr Gargan, Headmaster of St John's agreed to accept Billy if the Panel were agreeable, but that he would like to meet him first. Advised Dr Lythross and Mr & Mrs Toop. A meeting was arranged for Billy at St John's. He was allowed to see ground and agreed that he would like to transfer.

Billy refused to return home for the remainder of June and indicated that he did not wish to return for his summer holidays. He did however reluctantly agree to return home.

JULY

It was not thought that Billy will be able to sustain such a prolonged period at home. Discussed this with Billy and advised him that should things become difficult for him he should not consider running away from home but should contact S.S.W. E. Manneiff to discuss the difficulties.

Request received from Reporter regarding an alleged offence committed by Billy when he was away from home in May.

Home situation broke down within a few days and Billy called at office and after discussion with parents was returned to Dr Lythross ~~office~~ by E. Manneiff S.S.W.

Miss Foster, Dr. Lythnes had requested that Billy go home for weekend leave on 28th July. A check was made with Mr & Mrs Joop as to whether or not Billy could return home. It was discovered that he had run away from Lythnes on Tuesday. E. Mancrieff advised Miss Foster that this was hardly good behaviour and advised that he should not return home at the weekend.

letter sent to Reporter recommending that no further action be taken against Billy in view of latest referral. Request received for Billy's annual review and report completed recommending that he transfer to St John's.

Billy has again started going home at weekends and according to his parents there have been no problems. Dr Lythnes staff are finding Billy easier to handle and it may be that the knowledge that he could see he leaving has given him the incentive to do well.

Again contacted Mr Lygan, Headmaster St John's and agreed that Billy could start there on the 3rd September as his Panel has been arranged for 30th August. Panel agreed to Billy's transfer and he was allowed to go home until 3rd September.

SEPTEMBER
Billy was admitted to St John's on 3rd September and a meeting arranged for his parents for the following day. He appeared to settle quite well and as is the routine in St John's was not allowed leave for the first three weeks. Mr and Mrs Joop took turns at visiting on Thursdays and Sundays and did not miss a visiting day until Billy's first leave. Mr Joop continues to visit every Thursday.

Weekend leaves have been very successful with Billy presenting no problems. He knows that should any difficulties arise he can now return to St John's without much difficulty. Mrs Joop appears to be much more relaxed and claims that she has had no arguments with Billy at all.

Just Review date at St John's has been arranged for 2nd October.

Review at St John's confirmed that Billy had settled very well. He has as yet not made any particular friends but is reasonably well quoted in the 'pecking order'. He works well in classes and workshops and has presented no problems to staff so far.

Having settled so well and coped with initial weekend leaves it was thought that an extended period at home may be a testing period for Billy. He was at home from 13th - 22nd October and there were no problems experienced.

The only complaint Billy seemed to have was that he was bored.

Mr. Toop continues to visit Billy every Thursday and Billy's weekend leaves seem to be successful. He now has a new girlfriend whom he met at the 'shows'.

Billy last appeared before the Panel on 16th July, 1985, when his supervision requirement under Section 44(1)(b) was continued.

He has continued to experience some difficulties but as usual they can be attributed to difficulties at home. The most recent difficulties have been his parents somewhat nomadic existence since being evicted from their home in July, 1985.

As a result Billy has been unable to be with his family other than on day visits. This has not been entirely negative and to some extent allowed Billy to take himself away from potentially explosive situations and return to the security of St. John's.

Apart from fluctuating moods Billy's general behaviour at St. John's has been reasonably good. He has achieved City and Guilds Certificates and is enrolled at an outside college on a computer course one day per week.

In September Billy moved into hostel accommodation within St. John's, and would appear to be enjoying the relative independence. Before long he was enquiring about the possibility of leaving St. John's. Areas for consideration were hostel accommodation or supported lodgings, neither of which appealed to Billy.

Due to his parents precarious housing situation it became increasingly unlikely that Billy would have the opportunity to return home. His parents moved to Ayr in November, to stay with relatives however and Billy began visiting at weekends. Before long he was insisting that he wished to join his family in Ayr.

Billy has been subject to Section 44(1)(b) since November, 1983, and it is thought that St. John's has little further to offer him other than accommodation. In view of the fact that he is now sixteen and wishes to return to his family it is recommended that his present supervision requirement be terminated at this stage.

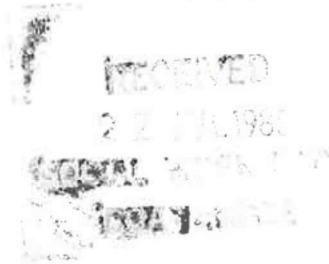



Billy last appeared before the Panel on 30th August, 1984, for the purpose of Review, when the decision was taken to vary his Residential Supervision Requirement from Dr. Guthrie's List 'D' to Springboig St. John's List 'D'. The decision was taken in view of the fact that Dr. Guthrie's was due for closure and that, he was experiencing some difficulty in being placed so far from his home environment.

For a considerable period at Dr. Guthrie's Billy had been experiencing difficulties during home leave which resulted in his refusal to return home for long periods of time. The change of school was not seen as the answer to relationship difficulties at home but to allow Billy to maintain closer links with his community.

Billy settled into the routine of St. John's with little difficulty. Initially he had some trouble in forming relationships with his peers but gradually gained their acceptance. His main difficulty in school now centres around his relationships with Staff in that he occasionally displays unacceptable behaviour to ensure that his weekend leave is stopped. Staff at the school are aware of this and do make allowances for him.

In an effort to ensure that he would not have to return home at Christmas Billy was involved in shoplifting and therefore confined to St. John's where he knew special treats and activities would be available to him which he would not have at home.

The home situation has shown little or no change, but the majority of Billy's weekend leaves have been reasonably successful. He still shows occasional reluctance to go home and this can usually be attributed to a disagreement with his mother.

A possible reason for Billy's weekend holiday periods having been quite successful whilst at St. John's may be due to the fact that his father now visits every Thursday and keeps Billy more up to date with his home situation.

At the present moment however, Billy is refusing to return home at all due to a recent argument with his mother. Mrs. Jaap is also of the opinion that he should not return until he is prepared to apologise to her. Following this argument Billy returned to St. John's and then absconded for two days.

It would now seem unlikely that Billy will return to live at home on a permanent basis and Staff at St. John's are considering him for 'flat' accommodation within the school where he can prepare for independent living.

It is felt that Billy still has some way to go as far as his relationship with his mother is concerned and it will also be some time before he is ready for independent living. It is therefore recommended that his present Requirement be continued.





On admission to Springboig St. John's, William settled with the greatest of ease. He quickly made friends but had a little more difficulty relating to the staff. He tended to be over-familiar and cheeky but it would appear that this was William's sense of humour and his only way of relating to adults. He showed himself to be a likeable, co-operative lad displaying a positive attitude towards the school in general.

By November, 1984, William's behaviour and attitude drastically deteriorated. He was abusive and truculent towards staff and refused to take care of his own personal hygiene, leading to rebuff and ridicule from his peers. It would now appear that this was William's way of indicating that things were not well at home and that he wanted to be refused leave. On 15.12.84 William was charged with the present offence and therefore forfeited leave over the Christmas period. This did not seem to bother William in the slightest. He was granted leave at the New Year and since his return to the school on 7.1.85, he has experienced a very inconsistent period. In January, 1985 he was kitted out with new clothes and this helped his confidence a lot and made him more aware of his appearance thus making him more acceptable to his peers.

Staff have tried to encourage William to discuss his problems more openly as it was becoming apparent that the more Mrs. Jaap had to drink at the weekends, the more unhappy William was and therefore the more disruptive his behaviour on his return to school.

In recent weeks, William has been able to discuss his circumstances, arrange leave and to display a more mature side to his character. This has certainly been made easier by the fact that home life in the past fortnight has been more bearable.

Academically, William was found to be of low average intelligence and therefore placed in a group preparing for City and Guilds in Communication Skills and Numeracy. He has completed part 1 and although, capable of part 2, lacks interest. He is a lazy pupil, difficult to motivate. Vocationally, William opted to join the Joinery Department where his instructor reports that he is developing some skills but his efforts very much depend on his success on leave.

Overall, William is making progress, but it is obvious that there is still a lot of work to be done. In discussions with William and Mr. Constable, it would appear that little or nothing can be done to change the family and that all resources should be concentrated on William being able to cope better with the Jaap's way of life. We would respectfully suggest that the Hearing deal with this referral in a way that will allow us to continue our work with and for William to the benefit of all concerned.

Billy last appeared before the Panel on 30th August, 1984, for the purpose of Review, when the decision was taken to vary his residential supervision requirement from Dr. Guthrie's List 'D' to Springboig St. John's List 'D'. The decision was taken in view of the fact that Dr. Guthrie's was due for closure and that, he was experiencing some difficulty in being placed so far from his home environment.

For a considerable period at Dr. Guthrie's Billy had been experiencing difficulties during home leave periods which resulted in his refusal to return home for considerable periods of time. The change of school was not seen as the answer to relationship difficulties at home but to allow Billy to maintain closer links with his community.

Billy settled into the routine of St. John's with little difficulty. Initially he had some difficulty in forming relationships with his peers but gradually gained their acceptance. His main difficulty in school now centres around his relationships with members of staff in that he occasionally displays unacceptable behaviour in an effort to ensure that his weekend leave is stopped. Staff at the school are aware of this and make every effort to make allowances for Billy.

The home situation has shown little or no change, although the majority of weekend leaves have been reasonably successful, Billy still occasionally shows a reluctance to go home. Mr. Jaap has visited Billy each week since he was placed in St. John's and this had helped to pave the way for weekends and holiday periods. There is however a long way to go before Billy will return home on a permanent basis if at all.

GROUND'S OF REFERRAL:

Billy has tended to play the matter down and insists that he mistakenly put the cassette tape into his bag and forgot about it.

Staff at St. John's and the writer are convinced however, that Billy took the tape to ensure that his Christmas leave would be stopped and he would remain in St. John's where he knew that special treats and activities would be available to him which he would not have at home.

CONT'D/WILLIAM JAAP.

CONCLUSION:

Billy has been in St. John's since 3rd September, 1984, and at the present time it is not envisaged that he will be leaving before he is sixteen.

It is almost certain that his motive for taking the tape was to ensure that he would lose his holiday leave.

In view of these circumstances it is not thought that there is anything to be gained by holding a further Panel at this stage and that the matter can be dealt with under the present requirement.



The family live in a three apartment local authority house, previously the home of Mrs. Jaap's father - Mr. Wotherspoon, who died in March, 1984. The family were evicted from their own home and subsequently have lived in various places. Initially, they lived with Mr. Wotherspoon for one and a half years, then with various friends for one and two years, then eventually in homeless accommodation before returning to Mr. Wotherspoon whose health was deteriorating rapidly and was not capable of living alone.

Throughout their sixteen years of marriage, there has been a considerable amount of friction between the parents, although they have only separated once for two or three weeks. Mr. Jaap has been unemployed for four years now, an engineer to trade, he worked for about six years on the Railways. Mrs. Jaap had a considerable drinking problem and was unable to care properly for the children. Now that Mr. Jaap is at home, matters have improved and Mrs. Jaap is now capable of carrying out the household tasks.

Personal History

William was born in Glasgow and stayed there for the first three years of his life, the family then moving to Coatbridge. He is said to be normally healthy and his development has been normal, however, William became a cause for concern at Rosehall High School and the Social Work Department were consulted. It became clear that William had difficult relationships at home and the one with his mother was particularly fraught. The school were worried about William's poor standard of physical care and also his aggressive behaviour within the school.

In October, 1982 he was transferred to Coatbridge High School. Initially, he settled well and attendance and behaviour were most acceptable. However, there

was a deterioration and William began absenting himself from the home. Mr. & Mrs. Jaap felt that William was now outwith their control. He fluctuated between being fairly biddable and downright defiant. On two occasions he absented himself from home for two or three nights.

By August, 1983, William was admitted to Calder House Assessment Centre and Psychologist and Psychiatric Reports were requested. Following this, William was placed in Dr. Guthrie's List 'D' School, where he remained until his transfer to Springboig St. John's in September, 1984.

PROGRESS IN SCHOOL

a) CLASS REPORT

Willie is of low average intelligence and on the evidence of the test results achieved, is working well to his potential. Willie is a likeable lad, co-operative and pleasantly mannered and capable of conversing in a very mature manner.

Initially, Willie was a little introverted but through time it has become clear that this was almost certainly due to the newness of another placement, indeed at times Willie's noise level can be quite high and he needs to be reminded of a few of the ground rules. Overall, however, Willie has been impressive and his attitude to work has been extremely good.

In language work Willie has shown himself to be a competent, fluent reader who enjoys reading for pleasure. His written work is generally well presented and shows good evidence of proper grammar and writing skills. Willie has an extensive vocabulary which, if anything, he underuses in his creative writing.

In number work Willie again shows fine skills in dealing with a wide range of topics. He is proficient in all the basic operations, and competent in decimal calculations. Money problems and general problem analysis type exercises offer a little problem to Willie.

Considering Willie's obvious strengths I would suggest his placement in class 2 and his future inclusion in City and Guilds work.



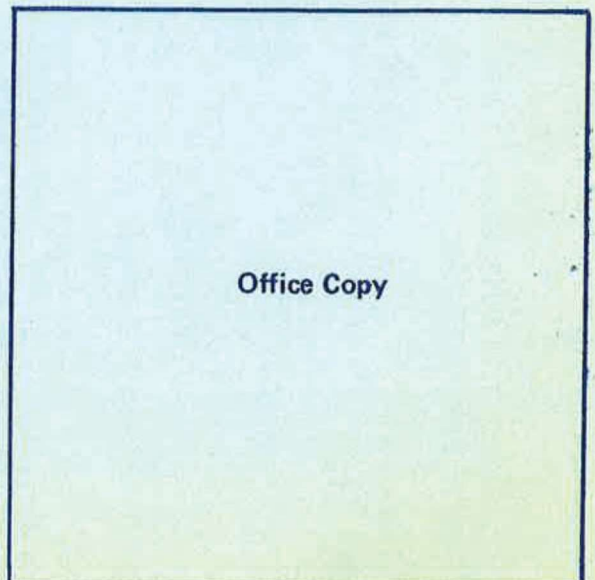



William's last review (report dated 21/6/84) was held as a result of increasing concern for his wellbeing. Increased family pressures following the death of Mr. Wotherspoon (Mrs. Jaap's stepfather) and the continuing conflict between William and his parents had intensified his feelings of rejection. Within Dr. Guthrie's staff were faced with a very volatile, aggressive young man, unable to relate to those around him and constantly in a state of conflict. Efforts to explore William's problems with Mr. and Mrs. Jaap proved fruitless - the boy's parents resisting any responsibility for his state and denying family pressures. The review concluded by recommending that a placement be found nearer to Coatbridge, thus enabling closer work to be undertaken with the parents.

As agreed at that review Mr. Constable (Local Authority Social Worker) approached Mr. Gargon, the Headmaster of St. John's School, Springboig. On 27/6/84 William visited this school to meet the staff and to speak with Mr. Gargon. William was impressed with the school and appreciated that its situation offered greater opportunity for work with his parents and more flexible home contact. From discussions with him since that visit it would appear that the boy would like to go to St. John's, feeling that the school is in a better position to meet his needs than Dr. Guthrie's.

Discussions between St. John's School, Coatbridge Social Work Department and Dr. Guthrie's have resulted in William being offered a place at St. John's on 3rd September, 1984, subject to the Panel's approval. Our recommendation therefore, to the Panel members, at the forthcoming Hearing is that William be allowed to take up the placement offered by St. John's.

Grounds of Referral Review

Billy last appeared before the Panel on 1st November, 1983, when his home supervision requirement was varied to residential naming Dr. Guthrie's List 'B', Edinburgh.

Since going to Dr. Guthrie's Billy has made some progress both educational and emotional. The main difficulty however still exists, this being, his relationship with his mother. Weekend leave and holiday periods have been difficult with Billy returning to Dr. Guthrie's earlier than planned or on occasions running away.

As a result Billy has often spent longer periods within Dr. Guthrie's than would have been desirable. On occasion his leave was denied and also Billy refused to go home. The distance from home is seen as presenting difficulties as Billy could become alienated from the Coatbridge area by spending prolonged periods in Edinburgh.

Staff at Dr. Guthrie's and the writer feel that it may now be in Billy's best interest to be accommodated much nearer home. Although this may not improve relationships within the home it will allow Billy to maintain links with his community.

Since being at Dr. Guthrie's Billy has seldom had what could be described as a good home leave period. Any progress made by staff at Dr. Guthrie's would appear to have been undone.

Attempts to effect change in the Jaap household have met little success. The family housing situation is precarious. They are technically not entitled to be in their present home as the tenant, Mrs. Jaap's step-father, died in March, 1984. Should the District Council become aware of this situation the family would again become homeless as they are not entitled to another house having been evicted for rent arrears some five years ago. Attempts have been made to encourage Mr. Jaap to come to some arrangement with the District Council to pay the arrears over the last year but he has failed to do so.

Being on State Benefit the family do experience financial difficulty and it is thought that their situation is made more difficult due to excessive drinking, although this is denied.

Relationships between Billy and his mother are unlikely to improve and he is now coming to the stage where he understands that he will have to live with his situation with a view to making a life for himself in the future.

It is thought to be in Billy's best interests to move to a List 'D' School which is much closer to his home, enabling him to have easier access to his home and surrounding area. Should the Panel consider this appropriate, St. John's, Springboig will be prepared to accept Billy.

Since being placed in Dr. Guthries this is the first referral received. At this time Billy had been outwith his home for eight days. He admits to being outside the 'Pool Hall' but does not admit to attempting to enter the premises.

Increasing staff concern over William's home situation and deteriorating emotional state merited the calling of an emergency review to re-assess the case. This review took place on 13/6/84 and Mr. D. Constable was present to represent the Coatbridge Social Work Department.

On 27/3/84 Mr. Wotherspoon (Mrs. Jaap's stepfather) died at home. This effectively left the family facing future eviction - the tenancy of the home being Mr. Wotherspoon's and William's parents having previously accrued rent arrears of approximately £700. These factors considerably increased pressures on the family, and in reaction to the additional stress, William's behaviour quickly deteriorated. Staff began to face a very angry volatile individual unable to relate positively to those around him and constantly in a state of conflict. As in the past, William's relationship with his mother and ~~his~~ his difficulty in accepting her alleged increase in drinking appeared to be the focus of his anger.

Efforts to explore these problems with Mr. and Mrs. Jaap have proven to have little success. William's parents deny William's allegations of his mother having a drink problem and are unable to accept any responsibility for his present state. Advice on the family's housing problem has been met with empty promises from Mr. Jaap to the effect that his mother was willing to meet their debt and that he was in contact with the Housing Department to negotiate a settlement. More recently he has admitted to having done nothing to resolve the problem.

The review felt that at present William is in a very vulnerable state. He is looking for an identity and needing the love of a positive parent/son relationship - only to have these needs denied. He now feels rejected, confused and very angry. It was generally agreed /

agreed that this case required a fairly intensive period of casework with William and his parents in an effort to establish a more objective and realistic base for work. It is becoming more apparent that William's placement at Dr. Guthrie's is not meeting his needs - the distance between school and home restricting our ability to keep in close contact with Mr. and Mrs. Jaap.

The review concluded with the following recommendation:

Accepting that William's problems are within the home, and that his case required greater parental involvement, a more appropriate placement should be looked for, nearer to the Coatbridge area. Mr. Constable suggested two possible alternative List 'D' Schools which may be interested in William's case - St. John's and St. Phillip's - and agreed to make initial enquiries at both establishments.

Relationships with other Children in Class.

There was a deterioration in Billy's attitude towards others in the class, over the fortnightly period prior to his "failure to return". He has been moody and at times bad tempered. His patience has been limited and he is often snappy; at times he has shown aggression towards his weaker classmates. In short he has to some extent reverted to the character who first arrived at Dr. Guthrie's six months ago.

Relationships with Teachers. Of late Billy has shown signs of rebellion although as yet he has not taken this to the extent of rejecting authority. He will still produce good work but only when pushed. He can be friendly at times but more often than not is huffy and argumentative. Over the past two weeks his attitude has been variable, fluctuating between friendly co-operation and sulky stubbornness.

Literacy. Not any significant improvement in literacy. Billy is still competent orally but written work tends to be hurried and as a result untidy. Texts Word Perfect (6); Understanding through Interest. Test result 12.5

Numeracy. Shown some improvement and can tackle work in length, volume & weight involving the four rules. He is also sound in simple Geometry. Test result 11.0.

Technical. Works reasonable well & has some skill.

Art. Huffy at times but in general works well. Has some trouble in this subject.

P.E. Performance and attitude deteriorated recently. Moody & ill natured.

An internal review was held for William on 25/1/84. Present were Mr. W. Constable, (Local Authority Social Worker) and staff from Dr., Guthrie's.

William's family live in the home of Mr. Wotherspoon (Mrs. Jaap's step-father) who is virtually an invalid. Having accrued sizeable rent arrears Mr. and Mrs. Jaap are unable to acquire a tenancy of their own, a factor which gives cause for concern when looking at William's future. The repayment of these arrears was seen as an area of Local Authority Social Work responsibility to be explored with Mr. and Mrs. Jaap.

Reports on the family indicate little change. Mr. Jaap continues, with only limited success, to manage the home and "keep the peace" while his wife makes little help to assist. The two younger children Andrea and Stuart appear to be coping at present although it is felt that Stuart may be beginning to experience similar pressures to William.

It is becoming increasingly evident that William's problems are directly linked to relationships within the home - more so his relationships with his mother. Mrs. Jaap is described as being a dominant, very immature woman with a drink problem. In the past William's running away has provided a focus for his mother to project her feelings on, and, as a result, he has become the family scapegoat.

Since his admission in November William's residence in Dr, Guthrie's seems to have provided a sanctuary in which he can obtain relief from the pressures he experiences at home, and this enables both the boy and the parents to cope better when together during leave periods. His parents feel that their relationship with William is improving, however the boy himself denies this, stating that arguments between his mother and himself still occur frequently at weekends.

Within the school William presents himself as a very energetic and active boy who quickly established himself as a disruptive influence. He can be very antagonistic and challenging to both boys and staff. It is generally felt that he has yet to reveal the /

the full extent of this side of his nature. On a more positive note William can be good humoured and biddable and since his admission his behaviour has improved. There are also signs of increasing ability to accept and live within the school's structured environment.

Within the educational setting William was initially very disruptive, but apparently he has settled down considerably and is now working at an acceptable level. For a more detailed understanding of the boy's classroom attainment please refer to the educational report attached.

In looking to the future the review members felt it appropriate to increase the school's contact with Mr. and Mrs. Jaap in an effort to develop a more meaningful working relationship.

In an effort to establish William's ability to cope with pressures at home and the importance he places upon weekend leave, it was decided to increase his weekend leave by one day. This was prompted by the boy's apparent lack of incentive to work for extended home contact and also to provide the school with an indication of family relationships at present.

Relationships with other children in class. Initially, Billy tended to be argumentative with the others in the class and, on one or two occasions, this resulted in physical aggression. He now gets on well enough with his classmates, although his enquiring nature does, at times, cause some irritation. He is well able to stand up for himself and is therefore not the subject of bullying. EH16 6RZ

Relationships with teachers: For his first few weeks on entering the class, Billy was completely apathetic to school work and showed a fair degree of stubbornness. When confronted, he would become passively rebellious. This situation has improved greatly, although he still needs pushing. He lacks motivation and would do nothing if left to it. Generally, he is now outwardly friendly and talkative, but the defiant temperamental facet of his nature lies not far below the surface.

Special interest & skills: Billy enjoys reading and drawing - he will often rush through his work assignments to get back to some cartoon drawing he has started.

Strengths & weaknesses: Although he does the work asked of him, Billy never pushes himself and is not keen to try something new.

Literacy: Verbally, Billy communicates well and can take part in a discussion with competence. He reads well and with understanding. In written work he is careless and untidy, mainly through his wish to get it over with in a rush.

Numeracy: Billy is a few years below par in Arithmetic. He can handle the four basic rules and can use these successfully in calculations involving money, length and weight. He is unfamiliar with the more advanced concepts encountered in secondary school.

Test REsults: Vernon Maths 10.5 yrs. Burt Word 12.6 yrs.

Art: He shows some enthusiasm and produces some nice work.

Physical Education: Variable - he can work well when in the mood, but at times he can be awkward and needs continual prodding.

General Comments: Billy would need some remedial help with Mathematics, but otherwise he could cope with the educational content/

content of mainstream schooling.

Recommendations: Billy should remain in a junior class at present.
He will move onto Friday leave status as of this week.

Billy is the oldest child in a family of three who live in the Lanarkshire town of Coatbridge. The remainder of the household consists of Andrea (11 yrs), Stuart (7 yrs), mother, father and maternal grandfather who is virtually an invalid.

Mr. Jaap has been unemployed for over three years. He was previously employed as an engineer on the Railways. Mrs. Jaap appears to have a considerable drink problem, which got worse following the death of her own mother in 1979. The fact that Mr. Jaap is in the home during the day has alleviated the problem, and he is in a position to control his wife's drinking. This, in turn, ensures that she is in a state to carry out the household tasks which, in the past, were being neglected.

Billy's problems seem to be directly linked to the relationship difficulties within the family. - although this only came to light when Billy commenced his secondary education in 1981. The Social Work Department first became involved in September last year when Billy was referred to a Children's Hearing; the grounds of referral being theft of a bicycle. This offence, added to the difficulties Billy was having at Rosehall High School, prompted the Hearing members to make Billy the subject of a Supervision Requirement.

In October 1982, Billy transferred to Coatbridge High School. This move was designed to give him a fresh start at a new school. His first term there proved quite successful, both in terms of conduct and attendance. By May of this year, however, the situation had once again deteriorated and Billy was suspended on two occasions prior to the summer break.

There had also been some difficulties within the home, but nothing that could not be managed. This situation altered in July, however, when Billy went missing from home on two occasions. The parents were now of the opinion that Billy was beyond their control.

A/

A Review Hearing was called in August, and the decision made to place Billy in Calder House for a period of assessment. On 13th September, Billy appeared at a further Hearing following his period in Calder House. At this stage the Panel took up the recommendation of the Assessment team to allow Billy to return home, with the stipulation that he attend the Department of Child and Family Psychiatry; he was still subject to a Supervision Requirement.

By October, however, there had been a further instance of Billy being away from home. What made the situation more concerning was that, on this occasion, the parents did not alert the Police or the Social Work Department regarding Billy's disappearance. These were the events which prompted Bill Constable, social worker, to approach Dr. Guthrie's Boys' School.

At the Pre-Admission Meeting it was agreed that this school would be an appropriate placement for Billy. He needs some time out from his family, and no doubt his parents will also benefit from the break. Billy's removal from home may help the family to focus on their own difficulties, particularly Mrs. Jaap and her drink problem. At the present time the two younger children are doing surprisingly well. It is to be hoped that neither have to take on the role of scapegoat while Billy is out of the home.

In realistic terms, it is unlikely that there will be any significant change within the household. The task of the school will therefore be to build up Billy's own resources to enable him to cope with what is on offer at home.

It is anticipated that the family will meet with school staff once a month during the initial period of Billy's stay.

The above-named boy is at present subject to a Home Supervision Requirement having last appeared before the Panel on 13th September, 1983.

On 29th July, 1983, he was received into voluntary care under Section 15, which was followed by a period of assessment in Calder House. He was seen as being outwith parental control and had run away from home on a number of occasions.

The recommendation of the assessment held on 6th September was that he should return home. The Panel accepted this recommendation with the stipulation that he attend the Department of Child and Family Psychiatry.

Since returning home the situation has shown little improvement and he has been outwith the home on two occasions overnight, the latter being for five days. During this time the parents did not inform the Police or the writer.

There is every indication that this situation will recur and it is now thought necessary to consider a residential placement for him. It is not thought that his needs would be satisfactorily met in a Children's Home and that the only other option is List 'D'.

A Review Hearing has been requested and a Panel arranged for 1st November, 1983.

Areas of Concern

1. Problems within the home and how William's behaviour is a reflection of this.
2. Related to the first, there is now truancy, temper tantrums within the school setting.
3. Mr. Jaap's inconstant participation in his family's guidance and support.

The two S.E.Rs dated September 1982 and July 1983 highlight considerable difficulties within the Jaap family as a whole. However, it must be said that certain areas are denied by Mrs. Jaap and she is reluctant to accept that the family dynamics have, in part, contributed to William's problems. It is only after lengthy discussion during this meeting that Mrs. Jaap has shown a willingness to become involved in any treatment programme that will attempt to resolve William's problems. Becoming part of any such programme does in itself possibly present another area of concern; this is the threat that Mrs. Jaap must eventually feel at exposing herself. We are of the opinion that this is an area that could bring about the failure of any effort that is home based.

Report from Coatbridge High School

Attendance: previous term 112/117; current term 140/142

William follows a non-Certificate course and overall is poor academically. He presents no discipline problem but recently has seldom been punctual and has truanted.

He has difficulty in forming relationships with peers.

So far as the school are aware William has no particular interest or hobby.

William can be a pleasant boy but finds difficulty in controlling his temper at times. This has resulted in two suspensions. He behaves well in class but is inclined not to bring books, etc. The school have sympathy with William regarding his poor home background.

Report from Calder House Classroom (Mr. McKean)

William has proved to be an enigmatic character during his short stay in Calder House. His behaviour fluctuated from one extreme to another extremely quickly.

He responded fairly well to a small class situation and I have no complaints about his application to work. He was not a difficult boy to motivate and seemed to enjoy and respond favourably to any extra attention or praise which was given to him.

His work is of a poor standard. He has specific difficulties as far as schoolwork is concerned. On Vernon Graded Maths/Arithmetic Test he had a number age of 10 yrs 5 mths and exhibited specific difficulties in simple division as well as most upper primary work.

Language work was of a slightly better standard. He has a good word reading age 12 yrs+ (Burt G.W.R.T.) but it is not reflected in his work. Sentence construction, general punctuation, spelling and handwriting are all badly in need of practice and revision. His comprehension of reading is also not a reflection of his word reading age.

William is quite a likeable boy, easy to work with in the small class situation. He is not disillusioned by schoolwork but it is dubious whether a large comprehensive can offer what William needs.

The problem is not an educational one and centres mainly on the home and relationships within the home, particularly William's relationship with his mother. He is an unhappy boy and again the reasons for this emanate from the home. The immediate priority would seem to be setting William up in an environment where he could feel secure and wanted and also where he would receive guidelines and controls.

Perceptions of Mr. & Mrs. Jaap (My observations)

Mr. & Mrs. Jaap were anxious to keep the focus of attention on William's bad behaviour, but they grudgingly agree that perhaps their own relationship and the family dynamics had something to do with his behaviour as well. Mr. Jaap impressed us as being rather evasive and not that involved. It appears that grandmother (now deceased 4 years) and mother had most to do with William's formative years and that perhaps he was very protected and over-indulged. Father is more or less saying that they were responsible - he should have been allowed to discipline William when it mattered most. It is now almost beyond his control and therefore the reason why he asked for William to be taken away from home.

Both, however, are now willing to have William back home, in the hopes that his time in Calder House will influence him for the better. They think he is certainly looking and acting a lot better.

Observations.../

Observations of Care Staff (Mr. Bathgate)

William settled quickly into Calder House and his admission posed no undue problems. An early impression was gained that William is a boy who has had a lot of his own way and by certain acts showed his intent to continue along the same path. He was casual in his manner and completely oblivious to routine or discipline. It took some time for William to realise that diverting from the rules and regulations was something that was not tolerated in Calder House.

Although William presented no serious discipline problems his behaviour was far from satisfactory. He identified with the delinquent element in the group and throughout his stay these associations were a source of trouble to him. On nearly every occasion when the group was left unsupervised, he was involved in some skirmish or other. He has a violent temper and never hesitates in lifting a piece of furniture to use as a weapon; he also has a foul tongue. He has been involved in endless scrapes and has the knack of creating conflict amongst his peer group, with the younger, less able members of the group he has attempted some fairly ruthless bullying, on being taken to task regarding this William can see no reason why he is chastised. To him it is part of normal behaviour. When the group was closely supervised the better side of his nature was seen.

William is sensitive to staff, their status and presence. When it suits him he is keen to please and careful not to be seen in a bad light. Left to his own devices, however, he is totally irresponsible and unreliable. William does not take kindly to being directed against his wishes and shows his resentment in his facial expressions.

In a work situation he showed little competence, his main aim was to get the job done quickly. In regard to this he was reluctant to obey instructions until he realised there was no other way out.

Concern is expressed regarding the lack of controls from the home and general opinions are that if William is not diverted from the downward trend seen in his behaviour prior to his admission to Calder House he could easily slide into delinquent ways. Disposal in this case cries out for direction, structure and affectionate care.

Discussion and Recommendation

There have been considerable difficulties and emotional turmoil within the Jaap family for a period of at least five years. During this period, starting with the eviction from their own home, the family have relied on friends and other more senior members of their extended family to provide them with living accommodation. As a result of this uncertainty they have been subjected not only to their own problems and situations but also those of the persons with whom they have shared homes. As a consequence Mrs. Jaap has certainly, in our opinion, become emotionally unstable and reacts to situations in an irrational manner from time to time.

William, in her opinion, is a perfectly normal boy, possibly immature for his years but given encouragement and support she felt he could settle down within the family. Should this be lacking the boy would not respond in a satisfactory manner and then a disposal that considered placement outwith the home would have to be opted for.


The outcome of this meeting was that the family have asked to be given the opportunity to accept help and support from both the social worker, Coatbridge High School

SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT - BILLY JAAP

Since the attached report was written, Bill again went missing from home on 26th July. He was found by the Police at 1 a.m. in Coatbridge Main Street. Billy was returned home and mother's response was to tie Billy's arms and legs to make sure he did not run off again during the night. After discussion with the Reporter it was decided to offer the family a voluntary admission to care under Section 15 of Social Work (Scotland) Act, however they felt able to continue with Billy at home until the Hearing set for 16th August.

Police will be interviewing Billy regarding 2 charges of theft relating to his spree in Helensburgh but it is not clear whether Billy will be charged.

Mr. and Mrs. Jaap may refer Billy themselves to the Reporter as being outwith their control.

The writer remains of the opinion that a period of assessment in Calder House, if possible, would be the best course of action at this stage to get some indication of Billy away from the family which would assist in assessing what kind of residential provision, if any, is the most suitable for Billy. As it seems unlikely given the control his parents are able to exercise over him that he can continue at home for much longer.

Billy began attending Coatbridge High School in October 1982. This move was designed to give him a fresh start at a new school, and he settled well. Given his previous record at Rosehall he settled far better than could really have been anticipated. He got on well with staff, his behaviour was good and although missing an odd half day, truancy was not a problem. His report after the first term reflected this with good conduct marks. School was therefore a fairly stable element in Billy's life until approximately the end of April, beginning of May and he appeared largely to be enjoying it. By the end of May, however, Billy had been suspended twice and the school was growing increasingly concerned about his behaviour. In class it continued to be generally good but there were reports of problems out of class, he was often late and taking the odd half day off despite warnings. He failed to do punishment exercises. By the end of last term his guidance teacher was beginning to be at a loss as to how to deal with Billy.

HOME:

Billy's home situation has remained much the same over the year. Mrs. Jaap continues to drink heavily and Mr. Jaap to have little influence over her. Friction between Billy and his mum remains and Billy fluctuates between being fairly biddable and downright defiant. Mrs. Jaap, however, is not amenable to discussion on how her drinking and subsequent regression towards both Billy and Mr. Jaap may be affecting Billy and there seems little scope for change in this direction.

Mr. Jaap, for his part, does not have the strength to keep on top of the situation and his solution is to keep out of his wife's way and to advise Billy to do the same. His relationship with Billy is at times quite good and he has put in quite a lot of effort into trying to discipline Billy. The inconsistencies and chaos, the result of fairly heavy drinking, make it difficult for solid approach to be achieved however. The situation at home was however holding until recently although Mrs. Jaap continued to sporadically complain

of Billy's behaviour.

In the past two weeks, however, Billy has absented himself from home on two occasions. On the first of these occasions he was missing from home from Wednesday, 13th July to Saturday, 16th July. He climbed out of the bathroom window at home having been told that he would be kept in following coming home late the night before. He was picked up by the police on Saturday in Coatbridge. He then went out to play on Wednesday, 20th July and was found by the police in Helensburgh with two friends on Saturday, 23rd July. There was no apparent friction at home which instigated this being away from home and Billy's story this time was that he and his pals had gone to Helensburgh, his pals had spent the return fare and he says that some other boys they met lent them a tent. Both Mr. and Mrs. Jaap are now feeling that Billy is beyond their control as his chastisement after the first episode made no difference to his willingness to repeat it.

Up until this point Supervision has largely been an exercise in containment, as long as school was a stable element in Billy's life there was scope for building on this achievement. ~~Now~~ His behaviour at school may improve with the start of a new year and there had been hope that Billy would be able to begin the local I.T. group, it appears that given the lack of control which his parents are able to exercise over Billy that consideration will require to be given to residential place for him as home seems to be coming less viable.

The dilemma at present is that Billy is not a delinquent boy and therefore List 'D' School does not seem the most appropriate place. It is doubtful whether a Children's Home would provide sufficient structure for him. I would ask that the Panel consider sending Billy for a period of assessment at Calder House so that alternatives may be examined.

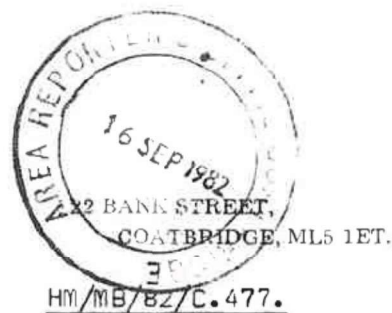

PERSONAL HISTORY:

Billy was born in Glasgow and stayed there for the first three years of his life before the family moved to Coatbridge. He is said to have been normally healthy and his development has been normal. He attended Kirkshaws Primary School, Gartsherrie Primary School and finally Old Monkland. As can be seen from his school report since going to Rosehall High School Billy has been a cause for concern to them. The family were referred to this Department in June of this year and I have been visiting since this time. It is clear that Billy has difficult relationships at home his relationship with his mother being particularly fraught. Mrs. Japp in fact comes across as having almost given up with Billy although father does not share this view. My impression is that in recent weeks the father has been taking more of an active interest in Billy and has taken him along with him when visiting his brother and his mother. Through the W.R.V.S. clothes have been arranged for Billy as he had been quite badly clothed, as can be seen from the school report. One of the school's concerns were Billy's poor standard of physical care that this has increased his problems with school is understandable and my opinion is that his physical care has improved somewhat with his father being around to keep an eye on this. Billy's behaviour at school however does not seem to have improved and he was suspended from school shortly after the beginning of term, this was a result of aggressive behaviour within the school. He has now returned to Rosehall High School although Mr. and Mrs. Japp are considering applying for Billy to go to Coatbridge High School this move will be made on the advice of Brother Cuthbert and myself as we felt that given the antagonism Billy was showing towards schooling at Rosehall High that a change of school might give him a new start, he is in any case in the "catchment area" for Coatbridge High. I have discussed Billy with Brother Cuthbert and a meeting was arranged between the family, myself and Brother Cuthbert, as a result of this Brother Cuthbert is prepared should Billy's truancy continue at Coatbridge High School to consider taking him to Bonnyhill.


Billy impresses as rather a confused and mixed up wee boy. While being desperate for more attention particularly from his mother he displays quite a lot of aggression towards her and his parents are finding it difficult to control him. Billy has few interests and finds relating to children of his own age difficult. I am however hopeful that a change of school better control of the home situation by Mr. Japp and encouragement for him to continue putting more effort into his care of the children as well as his wife's will help stabilise Billy's situation.

CIRCUMSTANCES SURROUNDING THE GROUNDS OF REFERRAL:

Billy has always denied the grounds of referral. He claims that he had been playing with the boy [redacted] playing about on his bike. Billy states that [redacted] was riding the bike and went behind some trees he states that he came back without the bike and his face cut and said that he had fallen off the bike. Billy claims that he and [redacted] then went to look for the bike but could not find it. According to Billy on the next day he met another boy who had a bike which was similar to [redacted]. He claims that this boy let him have the bike during that day with instructions to bring it back to him in the evening.

SUMMARY & ASSESSMENT:

Billy and his family are clearly in need of continuing social work support, I am hopeful that the plans outlined above will enable Billy to remain at home. Should the grounds of referral be proved or accepted my recommendation to the Children's Hearin would be that Billy should be placed on Compulsory Supervision.

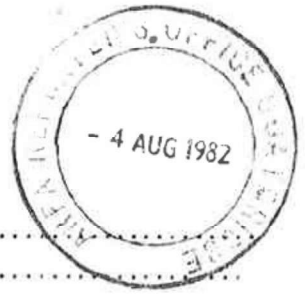

Dear Miss Moncrieff,

Thank you for getting Mr. Morrison to phone so quickly after Miss McGlynn's referral of William Jaap, 33d Kelso Quadrant, Coatbridge. I had intended to write to Mr. Graham giving a full account of this problem but delayed until Miss McGlynn of Child Guidance had seen him. Briefly the position is as follows.

Billy's domestic circumstances are such that his education and general development are now seriously impaired. I interviewed his mother away back in September 1981 after an instance of truancy and formed the impression that she was finding it difficult to cope with her domestic arrangements. Billy however, seemed to settle down to life at Rosehall. After Christmas the family moved to Kelso Quadrant since when his behaviour, appearance, work rate have deteriorated. Billy started to be late for school, sometimes as late as eleven a.m. He began to "dog" certain classes. He lost books and jotters, he looked extremely neglected. Discussions with Billy revealed that his mother and grandfather both drank heavily.

Before Easter, the school nurse saw Billy with unusual marks on his neck and bruising on arms and legs. Since Billy would not explain these and view of his unwashed neglected state I contacted Mr. Burgess of the R.S.P.C.C. who visited the home.

The suggestion that he had been ill-treated was not at all well received but no visit to the school by either parent resulted. Letters were written by me on 6th April and by Mr. Hutchison, Head Teacher, on 27th April asking the parents to visit the school. Father duly arrived on 5th May and confirmed the inadequacies of Mrs. Jaap. He asked that he be given a chance to try and improve the situation without involving your Department. He seems to have a good relationship with Billy but cannot cope with his wife's drink problem. The situation however has not improved at all. In fact Billy is now aggressive towards staff and pupils, he continues to be unclean and refuses to co-operate with class teachers. He is currently being withdrawn from certain classes.

WILLIAM JAAP CONTINUED

In telephone conversations with his mother, she says he is very difficult at home and is running about with "bad" company. Miss McGlynn of Child Guidance saw him on Tuesday 1st June and agreed to contact your Department also Dr. Buchanan saw Billy and his father on 13th May. She formed a good opinion of Billy and his relationship with his father. A great effort had been made to present Billy in a neat and tidy fashion.

I should therefore be most grateful if you could look at this situation as a matter of urgency.
