Review scope	Placement in care; abuse/neglect; disclosures; mental health, medication and therapy; self-harm; substance use; adult consequences; third-party records; contradictory and neutral findings

Important limitation: the historic care records contain strong placement, legal-status, deprivation and emotional-impact evidence, but no entry was found that contemporaneously records a physical or sexual assault on Philip. The GP record contains later disclosures of childhood physical and sexual abuse. Symptoms, pain and medication have not been treated as proof unless the record itself makes the connection.

Principal findings

Placement

Strong evidence across Reports pages 1-38 and Correspondence pages 4-17 of repeated care episodes, Larch Children's Home, Burnside House Assessment Centre, Ellen Street Boys' Hostel, Rossie School and the McDonald secure wing. Legal bases include care/supervision orders and Children's Hearing decisions.

Physical abuse

A 2025 GP summary records childhood physical/sexual abuse. No contemporaneous care entry documents a physical assault on Philip, a care-related injury, treatment, named perpetrator or safeguarding response. Adult easy bruising and pain entries do not record a causal link.

Sexual abuse

Later GP disclosures appear on SAR part 1 pages 2 and 20, with a more general childhood-abuse disclosure on page 23. No contemporaneous sexual-abuse entry, injury, STI, pregnancy-related evidence or named perpetrator was found.

Emotional/psychological abuse

Historic records describe peer name-calling, pressure and hostility at Burnside, 'traumatic experiences in Burnside,' deprivation, inconsistent parenting, lack of trust, unhappiness, insecurity and repeated absconding.

Neglect

Historic evidence includes uncleanliness, inconsistent care, maternal alcohol misuse, children's request to enter care because of drinking/company, emotional instability, lack of formal education while absconding, and inability of parents to provide consistent supportive care.

Mental health and treatment

GP entries record anxiety with depression, chronic low mood, anhedonia, low self-esteem, self-neglect, anger, sleep difficulty and relationship conflict. Treatment includes psychology/Dudhope referral, pain-clinic referral, citalopram, mirtazapine, amitriptyline, gabapentin and discussion of CBT.

Self-harm/suicide

No positive self-harm or suicidal event was found. Two clinically relevant negative findings were identified: 'Not actively suicidal. No thoughts DSH' (page 25) and 'no specific intent of self harm' (page 23).

Substances

The adult GP record states daily cannabis for sleep in 2017 and no other substances; historic Larch material reports possible glue sniffing but expressly says staff had not witnessed it. Adult alcohol screening was low/rare.

Neutral/contradictory

Records also describe periods of settling well and improvement. Rossie secure-wing admission is dated 19 January 1984 on Reports page 33 but 8 January 1984 on page 35. These inconsistencies and positive periods should be explained, not omitted.

Document-level conclusions

SAR part 1

Relevant evidence is concentrated on PDF pages 2, 19-25, 28, 32 and 35-36. The strongest abuse/impact entries are pages 2, 19, 20 and 23.

SAR part 2

No additional substantive responsive entry was found across PDF pages 1-88 (internal pages 171-258).

Correspondence - PR

Strong corroboration of placements, orders and moves, especially pages 4-9 and 13-17. These letters do not independently record a physical or sexual assault.

Reports - PR

Strongest placement and neglect/emotional-impact evidence. Particularly important pages are 3, 6, 12-20, 22-35 and 37-38.

Quality note: the two historic PDFs are image scans. OCR was used to locate evidence and the original page images were visually checked. Some early typed/handwritten text is faint; where a name or date could not be read confidently, the schedule says so. Highlighted copies retain the page image and add a searchable OCR layer.
