14.1.82	Home Visit. Spoken with Mrs. Fraser. The Police has been in this morning suspecting Stewart to have broken into Charleston Primary School last night. Stewart was seen by the Janitor with other kids throwing snowballs, one of which hit the Janitor. This was in the early evening. Stewart told his mother about this. Stewart was not out again. Mrs. Fraser doesn't think that he was involved as the Police indicated that the break-in happened later at night. She feels a bit annoyed that Stewart is suspected as he has been in trouble. This was the third time that the Police suspected him about something. The two previous occasions it was not him either. Next time she will make use of her right and refuse entry for the Police unless they got a warrant. Her other kids already start blaming Stewart as being a trouble maker. Discussed the Hearing. She felt that it was a good Hearing. Stewart believed that he was going to be sent away. Informed her about Dr. Mathew's message and she agrees for me meeting him and hopefully he can make home visit as Stewart would refuse a hospital visit. Later her boyfriend came who appears to be a quiet man. He has an eight year old son who plays with Stewart. He is separated for the past five years (divorced ² time) He takes an interest in Stewart and takes him places. He is living with his mother and working on the rigs as a foreman. It seems that he could be a good influence on Stewart.
15.1.82	Discussed the possibility of Stewart taking part in an IT group.
18.1.82	Discussed this with Mrs. Fraser and Stewart Mrs. Fraser is quite keen for Stewart to take part and Stewart would like to give it a try.

21.1.82	Home Visit. Spoken with Mrs. Fraser. The Police has been again at the door after another break-in at Charleston School and the Janitor had sent the Police saying that it may be Stewart. The Police said that they think that the Janitor picks on Stewart and left after she told them this time Stewart was at home. Started to discuss what we want to achieve and how to discuss what we want to achieve and how best to help Stewart. Most of all Mrs. Fraser wishes that the Police does not come any more. She also feels that Stewart is quite happy now and would like him to remain that way. We agreed on being open and co-operate with one another as a basic for working together. Mrs. Fraser will continue to check the boys rooms in case of any glue-sniffing and to keep Stewart away from his cousins. She also has asked him to stay away from Charleston Primary School.
	Discussed with her, her relationship with her boyfriend. She feels that they might be living together eventually but she wants to be really sure about that as she does not want another breakdown of a relationship. She finds his working on the rigs quite a strain and he told her that the marriages of many men there are either broken down already or are breaking down. A good sign she feels is that the kids and he like one another. Also that he helps in the house and doesn't drink. She says that he doesn't want to rush a move together either. I shared with Mrs. Fraser that I am glad that she doesn't rush into a relationship, but considers various matters first. She appears to discuss these thoughts with her boyfriend. On the whole it looks encouraging. Him working on the rigs however could put in the long run too much strain on to the family. A strain which can be abserved in almost every family where the husband is working on the rigs.
	At this point I do not want to work with Stewart's grief, but use the JT group as a base to get him to know. I myself have seen him only grief stricken and not otherwise.
21.1.82	Visited Dr. Mathew. For him the case is closed but he could easily re-open it and then work just with Stewart's grief. ne feels that the grief will effect Stewart/

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Stewart for the rest of his life and that Stewart himself will not speak about it and when the subject is brought up he will avoid it or cry. Dr. Mather feels that all of Stewart's actions are related to his father's death and that he feels guilty of having caused the death. Dr. Mather feels as Stewart will be going to the group and is described as being happier just now, it is not necessary for him to see Stewart. Dr. Mather however would like to be informed and if necessary work with his grief. The most important part he feels is at present to build up a good relationship with Stewart and release him of pressure. We agreed to meet again latest by the end of March.

I felt somewhat at a loss for not getting Stewart to speak despite not being able to persuade him to come along. Perhaps he still thinks that we would speak about father, offences, grief, etc. I left after about 20 minutes.

28. 1.82	Home visit. Spoke with Mrs. Fraser - one of her sisters was present. After checking out with Mrs. Fraser it was alright to speak about matters. Mrs. Fraser said that she still has not found out why Stewart did not want to go to the Group. There was something about one teacher (Mr. Harris ?) who wanted Stewart to write something as a punishment and give him the belt. It was then that the teacher asked about his social worker. Mrs. Fraser got the impression that the teacher threatened him with the social worker or something. Mrs. Fraser feels that I am not there as a stick for the school, but to help Stewart, and she tried to explain

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this to the boy. The other thing Stewart later mentioned was that he thought that I would speak to him about his father. She will tell him that neither I nor anyone in the group would speak about it. Stewart also mentioned that he doesn't know me really, quite rightly but Mrs. Fraser told him that he can only get to know people if he does speak to them. I told Mrs. Fraser that the place for Stewart in the group remains open. She feels that he will not change his mind.

Started to think about alternatives to getting to know Stewart. I felt it should be somewhat informal so that he does not disappear whenever I come. We would also have to think about whether it is necessary for me to see Stewart and perhaps better for the future social worker to get involved with Stewart. It certainly will be a long process for Stewart to build up a trusting relationship with a worker where he feels safe and secure. Stewart has a girlfriend whom he visits regularly. During the interview I did not go into too much detail as the sister was there.

The general purpose is that Stewart is on supervision. First of all I like to gain permission to use the Taperecorder in order to learn more for myself from the session. Mrs. Fraser will have a chance to listen to it and we can use it for feedback and learning together.

Then I want to agree with Mrs. Fraser on an agenda and bring forward the following points:-

- 1) Whether Stewart wants to come to the I.T. Group. If yes, to think about what help it could offer him. Also to get to know him better and find ways of helping him.
- If no, to work out other ways of getting to know Stewart.
- 2) What can mother or relations do to help him with his grief.
- 3) What she wants to do at the meetings to discuss points and to what end.
- 4) Meeting the needs of her children, discussing what she thinks her children's needs are, how she meets them, where she finds difficulty.
- 5) What she wants to discuss.

In previous interviews we have started to discuss the above matters, but I think

1. 2.82 Home visit. Spoke with Mrs. Fraser. She told me right away that Stewart has been involved in a further incident of glue-sniffing and a break-in. She agreed for the interview to be recorded.

OBSERVATIONS:

Mrs. Fraser was saying that she was looking for my car when I arrived at the door. I think she was looking forward to me coming. She appeared to be relaxed and spoke freely.

CONTENT:

The interview began with Mrs. Fraser telling me in detail how she found out about Stewart's glue-sniffing, break-in and truanting.

Last Wednesday he had met a 16-year old cousin and a 19-year old youth at the school and the break-in was planned for the same evening (that is why he didn't want to come to the I.T. Group). Mrs. Fraser feels that she should have realised at that moment that there was something wrong. Stewart was late another evening and she smelled glue which the other two had given to him. On Friday Stewart did not go to school. Stewart was with his cousin in town playing Space Invader machines. Stewart eventually told her about the break-in at a Post Office and that they tried to break into other shops. Mrs. Fraser then involved the Police who took a statement and arrested the others.

Mrs. Fraser has tried to speak to Stewart but did not get any response. She feels she is speaking to a brick wall as he turns away and ignores her. Therefore she feels a failure. Sometimes she thinks that he is playing on it to get more attention. Stewart had said that he feels he is being picked on, that everybody is against him and certainly doesn't see that people are trying to help him. Mrs. Fraser has said that Stewart now wants to come to the I.T. Group as I have to see him anyway.

We discussed briefly Stewart's grief and agreed that we both would have to find out a bit more about it. His cousin Wendy could play a role in this as they both are speaking to one another about this. Suggested to Mrs. Fraser that

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perhaps in the long run she should be the person to help Stewart over it.

Mrs. Fraser mentioned that until recently Stewart had always told her what he was doing during the day but has stopped doing so. Mrs. Fraser agreed to have tea a bit later with the children and T.V. switched off so that we could talk to one another about the happenings of the day. We shall see how this works out.

IMPRESSIONS:

Stewart again has been led by much older boys into trouble and I wonder why he chooses the company of older boys or is it that they are using him as his mother says. Mrs. Fraser is certainly at a stage where she doesn't know what to do and is willing to try things out.

MY ROLE:

My role was to listen to Mrs. Fraser's verbal communication as well as underlined feelings and feed these back to her in order that she can reflect on those.

Also to develop with her ideas of helping her, Stewart and the family in relating hopefully better with each other and find out different ways of parenting, so that she has a wider spectrum to come back to.

1. 2.82 Met Mrs. Johnson briefly in a liaising meeting and she told me that at the moment everything seems to be going wrong.

3. 2.82 Mr. Harris, Deputy Director, phoned. He told me that Stewart had been lying to him about punishment lines and tried to give him Billy's pretending they were his. He also wondered why Stewart was on supervision and whether it was true he was coming to the I.T. Group tonight. Told him briefly about Stewart's situation. Stewart has to hand in his lines tomorrow and he cannot use the Group as an excuse for not doing so.

Phoned Mrs. Fraser about the lines and she will make sure that he does them.

Home visit to collect Stewart. Stewart had been sitting over the lines for the past 1½ hours and had hardly written anything. The T.V. was on very loudly and Stewart was sitting in an armchair with a board on his knees. Stewart wanted to finish his lines and not come to the Group tonight.

I think at the next meeting I will discuss with Mrs. Fraser that when the kids are doing homework they cannot concentrate when the T.V. is on and that they should sit at a proper table to do their homework.

While at the Police Station Mrs. Fraser phoned wanting to speak to Sgt. Ramsay. When I came to the office she was there. Mrs. Fraser asked Stewart to get some messages for breakfast, but he never came back. She has been looking around the area but could not find him. After consultation with Mr. Fallon we informed the Police to look for him. In the early afternoon Mr. Harris phoned saying that the Police just brought Stewart in, as there was nobody at home. He can look after Stewart only until 4 p.m. I then went to collect Stewart. In the meantime Mr. Harris found two cans of glue on Stewart as well as plastic bags which Mr. Harris handed to me. Stewart was found in High Street.

Stewart came peacefully with me and we went to the Dudhope Arts Centre for a cup of coffee. Stewart was in tears and hardly spoke. Mostly he nodded his head. He is worried about his father, that mother went on holiday and has her boyfriend. Stewart felt that he couldn't promise to go to school. We then went to the office. While in the office Stewart was for a moment unobserved and run away taking the glue with him. I ran after him but couldn't find him. I then informed Sgt [REDACTED] and his mother.

I then had a long discussion with Mr. Nicoll and Mr. Clark. It was felt that Stewart should come into care when found. (Possible Sections are Sec. 69 and Sec 44(6)). As Stewart is very much in danger for his health and safety. There is a place at Burnside House. Visited Mrs. Fraser. Explained the situation to her. She would not like to ask Stewart to be taken into care but feels that he should for his own safety. She will let the police know should he turn up.

Drew simple diagrams for him and I gave him a questionnaire, mainly I explain, to help him think about himself, but also to help me to understand him (if he will share it with me). Mrs. Frazer's brother is interested in Stewart and I asked her to suggest to him we might meet. Mrs. Frazer took T.A. book home to read. I. Caplan.
29. 3.82	Stewart ran away on outing on Sunday and was picked up a few hours later by the police. We discussed the incident and looked at it in T.A. terms. He has not done his homework. Staff member who was to supervise him is off with broken ribs. His is more verbal and talks about Mike. Says Mike often hits him .. tells of incidents; Mum hits him sometimes with a strap and occasionally with a billiard cue. His mood is sad. Later in day Mrs. Frazer calls at office. She denies that Mike hits Stewart, except on one occasion - admits she has used strap to him (not a billiard cue) and agrees that it is not a good idea. Discuss situation with Mike. She has a joint account with him and he pays most of family bills. Stewart knows he plays a large part in supporting the family. Mrs. Frazer says she will always put Stewart's interests before Mike's. Mike will come to meet me on Thursday. I. Caplan.
1. 4.82	Mike appears to be a mild man. The tales of aggression seem unlikely. He says he has tried hard with Stewart ... takes him to football matches, etc. He agrees to cooperate with us to try to ease the difficulties. Mrs. Frazer and I go to Burnside. Stewart has done his homework and presents it proudly. He is a different boy. he is much more verbal, looks brighter, makes

more eye contact.

His answers (see file for questionnaire answers) are carefully thought over and helpful. I home in on No. 8 (I ask Mrs. Fraser to leave the room as I feel he will speak more freely).

We look at what scares him:-

- 1) Having lost school books
- 2) The police
- 3) Being accused of things he didn't do
- 4) That mum will love Mike more than him
- 5) Looking at his pain about dad

On No. 1 - Mum promises she will purchase a new set of books for him for him going back to school. We shall work out where they shall be kept and how they will be looked after.

On 2 and 3 - If there are further incidents of Stewart's being accused, I promise to intervene.

4 - Mrs. Fraser and Stewart make eye contact. She tells him she loves him and that he is more important to her than Mike. He cries and she holds him

5 - Says he understands, after I explain (have done so already) that he can only get rid of pain by talking about it and looking at it.

Agrees to do a further questionnaire and to keep a daily diary to help us and himself to understand his feelings. We give him much positive reinforcement.

Burnside staff have worked well with him. It is agreed he can go home for the weekend; he will be picked up at 2.00 on Friday and return about 4.00 on Sunday.

5. 4.82 Called to find Stewart had absconded - Left about 1.00 p.m. - arrived at home 9.00 p.m. Mrs. Fraser took him back to Burnside.

The weekend at home went well. It was unproblematic and he enjoyed it.

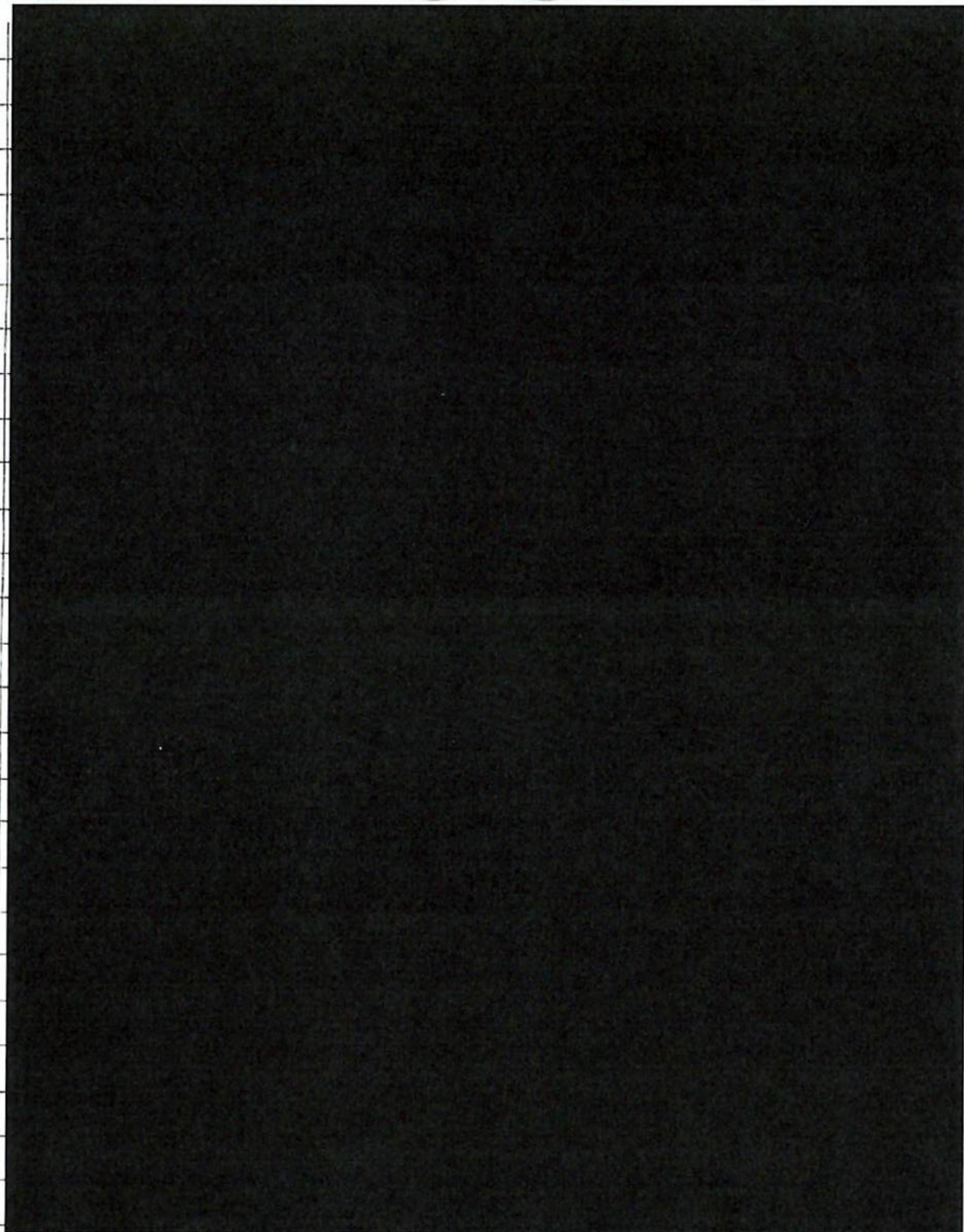

I see Stewart as quite manipulative and when he meets resistance, he does not like it. I sense he has a feeling of "it's all over" and resents having to "work". But generally all seems well. I will see him next Friday. I. Caplan.
21. 4.82	Mrs. Fraser came to the office as planned. At lunchtime Stewart pled "sick" and tried to manipulate Mrs. Fraser into allowing him to stay off school. She eventually got him to go back - but late. Dr. Mathai asked me to explore Mrs. Fraser's background. 

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Stewart is beginning to be cheeky, disrespectful and manipulative with his mum to a greater extent than before. Stated "I am boss here" recently. We discussed how to handle this.

Billy had a difficult incident at school but it seems to be resolved (he had to accept two of the strap!) But he looks well and relaxed. There seems to be much less nagging and Mrs. Fraser and Billy agree it is better between them. Billy says Mrs. Fraser nags much less when Mike is around (Mike says that's because she nags at him!) so he likes having Mike around. At one point Stewart states bluntly "I always have to get my own way and ~~will~~ win all the time". Mrs. Fraser, Mike and myself assure him that real life is not at all like that.

Mrs. Fraser feels she cannot manage a further session before she goes on holiday on Tuesday, 7th.

I saw Stewart on a weekly basis until Christmas and now plan monthly contact with him and have recently had detailed discussions with Stuart Eno who has regular weekly contact with Stewart at Bessie.

Both Stuart Eno and I have had talks with Unit staff to clarify Stewart's problems and what programme if any Bessie have prepared to help Stewart to return to the community and am awaiting minutes of the meetings from Stuart Eno.

Stewart was home for two days at Christmas and a visit which went very well.
