 - Not displaying any different behaviour from other boys in toilet, or when changing for gym.
 - Mrs Crosbie, Learning Support, is helping to catch him up with what he has missed.
- Therefore progress is occurring.

When [redacted] and William arrived for contact they were both happy and talking to each other. I had planned to give them the opportunity to talk about [redacted] move and their feelings around this. However their response when asked about [redacted] was to say that "He just went to-day..... can we go to the park" They were not interested in speaking about [redacted] nor did they appear to be upset or worried about him not being there.

The visit to the park was very positive with [redacted] and William playing well to-gether on the swings and chute and with the football.

When we came back to the centre William and [redacted] start to whisper and giggle to-gether with [redacted] encouraging William to write what she called "rude" words on the Fire Register Sheet. William wouldn't do this so [redacted] took it from him and said she would write "jobby" on the sheet. When I asked her why she wanted to do that she just laughed and wrote on the sheet. I didn't see what she wrote and when I told her that Mr [redacted] had arrived she jumped up and quickly and crumpled the sheet and put it in the bin. Both children were keen that I tell Mr. Maybe how "good" they had been.

Both William and [redacted] seemed to enjoy their time to-gether and were quite considerate of each other and there was no quarrelling or aggression during the contact. They both behaved very well and did what they were told when they were told.

William had supervised contact with his father yesterday - Maureen Petrie being the member of staff who was supervising.

Today, Mrs [REDACTED] observed what appeared to be finger marks/bruises to his shoulders which must have been painful at the time they were obtained. William says his father caused these; following which Mrs [REDACTED] contacted us for advice.

Approx. 3.45, home visit to Mrs [REDACTED] by self and Liz Mander. Spoke with William in Mrs [REDACTED] presence. He showed us the bruising to his arms; one bruise on the inside of his upper right arm and two on his left arm in the same position. He explained that while he was with his dad at Camperdown Park yesterday, he had lifted him up onto a tyre rope slide where he had hurt his arms. Maureen Petrie was also present during this time but William had not said anything about being hurt. Mrs [REDACTED] noticed bruising later last night. I advised her that I would advise Philip McGill of our contact so that he can discuss the situation with Mr Tarbett as it appears the injury was caused accidentally.

M Petrie on annual leave, hence contact supervised by self.

I collected William from Mr and Mrs [REDACTED] we then drove to Bruce Street Child & Family Centre. William seemed quite happy to be on the way to meet his mum, and asked me whether I thought she would have brought him a bike for his birthday.

Linda, and Karen Dorward (Manager, Bruce Street) were waving from the centre when we arrived. William ran in. Linda seemed pleased to see William, whilst he was looking around the room. Linda and Karen made a bit of a fuss of him - how much he has grown etc.

Linda gave William his birthday presents (birthday in 3 days): a football, a rugby ball, a tracksuit top and bottoms, a pair of trainers, and two cards, one from herself and the other addressed from [REDACTED] [REDACTED]

William liked each present, chose to put on the new clothes and trainers. William then asked Linda "Have you got me a bike for my birthday?". Linda explained that she hadn't and suggested that that might be a good Christmas present.

Karen brought in some photographs, of William, from his time at Lilybank Child and Family Centre. These were given to me to keep, I agreed to provide a set of copies for Linda.

William asked to be able to go to the Park, and chose Lochee Park, so he could play football. Linda wanted to go wherever William had chosen.

We arrived at Lochee Park. William took his football and rugby ball. Linda encouraged William to play football with her, with limited success - William seemed not very interested. He brightened however when another boy, unknown to us, asked to join in the game. The boy said he was [REDACTED] and seemed about 10 years old. William wanted to be on his team. Over next 10 minutes William played enthusiastically, with his eye always on [REDACTED] [REDACTED] was easily the better player of all of us. William showed he had limited understanding of the game rules, and was more interested in noting everything [REDACTED] did.

Andrew declared he had better leave, to look out for his younger brother. William saw [REDACTED] leave and then repeatedly asked, "where has [REDACTED] gone?" and "when will [REDACTED] come back?"

I encouraged William to choose a new game, he chose to move to the climbing frame. Linda encouraged William to climb without putting himself in danger. I sat on a bench letting [REDACTED] and William be together at the swings. [REDACTED] was trying to encourage William to play, William seemed a little restless and 'distant' and wasn't showing much interest in Linda's efforts to engage him.

It was time to leave. William asked if we could give Linda a lift, so I arranged to take her to Douglas, before returning William, as this was on our way.

Having stopped at a layby on Drumgeith Road to drop off Linda, Linda and myself having got out of the car, a small red car honked whilst passing and pulled in front of us. I recognised Mr Tarbett as the driver. Linda was anxious, and got back into my car.

I walked across to speak to Mr Tarbett through his car window. Mr Tarbett said he had stopped in order to speak to me, to say that he wouldn't be phoning me at the office or coming in to see me, nor would his solicitor. I explained I had to leave to return William and said "goodbye".

William was very curious as to what his dad wanted, I said that he had wanted to speak to me and had stopped after seeing me. We then drove away, letting Mr Tarbett leave first, and dropped off Linda, then to William's foster carers.

I called at Mr & Mrs [REDACTED] for William. William came to meet me, asking if he was going to see his Dad, would [REDACTED] be there, and where were we going? I told William it was arranged for him to see his Dad, but I had to phone my office to confirm this, as I had arranged with his Dad that he would phone the office if he wanted to change our meeting-place from Camperdown Park to McDonald's due to the weather.

I phoned the office, to be told [REDACTED] had phoned the office on behalf of Mr Tarbett and had arranged to meet William and I at McDonald's due to the weather.

William was chatty with me, he asked why his Dad had not given him anything for his birthday, and wondered if he would give him something today. William went on to chat about his holiday, and what he had been doing. There was no mention of his visit to Michael until I asked him about it. William said he liked where Michael was living.

3.00 pm. William and I met with Mr Tarbett, [REDACTED] at McDonalds. William was pleased to see them and ran to greet them. Mr Tarbett told William he had his birthday presents for him in the car. We all went into McDonalds and sat together. Time was spent in McDonalds having a snack and chatting together. Mr Tarbett and [REDACTED] instigated the conversations about what William has been doing and how he was. William was not very forthcoming. I encouraged William to tell them about his holiday, and seeing Michael, and he told them very briefly about this. We all walked together to Mr Tarbett's car, where he gave William gifts for his birthday, toys, trainers, and shorts, and he also gave him bags of sweets, fruit etc., and money.

4.00 pm. Visit ended. All happily said goodbye to each other.

I gave Mr Tarbett £1.60 for fares for today's visit.

William chatted happily to me on return journey about what he was doing tonight and about the club he has been going to. William was pleased his Dad had brought his birthday presents for him today.

William made very little reference about contact or his presents when asked about this from Mr [REDACTED], he was more interested in being allowed out to play.

[REDACTED] presented as being very settled and very much part of the [REDACTED] family.

We talked about what we would do today. Going on the Tour Bus in Dundee was decided.

We met with Laura Dunbar and William in the City Square. They were both pleased to see each other and happily played around while waiting for [REDACTED] to arrive. William was also keen to go on the bus.

Michael was brought to meet us by Phillip McGill and Carol, his keyworker from Thornbrae. Children all pleased to see each other and got very excited, boisterous. [REDACTED] didn't want to go on the tour bus, he discouraged [REDACTED] and William also from going on it.

[REDACTED] didn't show any interest in the photograph [REDACTED] gave him of herself.

We eventually decided to go Bowling. All three calmed down in the car but once in the bowling all became quite boisterous again, [REDACTED] wanting to be in control and William and [REDACTED] copying him in his manner.

William very quickly got bored with the bowling and started to climb over the seating and barriers. [REDACTED] then copied William. All became cheeky, disobedient, when discouraged from doing this. All continued like this for the remainder of the visit.

Linda eventually became sulky, crying.

Margaret Leslie and Phillip McGill arrived to meet up with us.

Phillip left with Carol & [REDACTED]

Margaret left with [REDACTED] and I returned William home.

I took William for lunch. Once William was in my car he completely changed, he calmed down and was keen to make conversation with me. He was very well behaved.

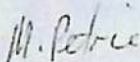
4pm

William asked if they could go to the horses, Mr Tarbett suggested they go to the play area which they did. The visit went well with William and [REDACTED] interacting well with each other with [REDACTED] joining in with them, asking William about school and how he was. Mr Tarbett made very brief conversation with William. Mr Tarbett encouraged William and [REDACTED] to go on the rope swing which they did but William refused to go back on it after he had bumped his head when Mr Tarbett pushed him too fast. They spoke about going to the zoo in the park, I suggested there wasn't much time left for this today but we could walk there to find out opening times which we did. Due to opening times all agreed this would be best done during school holidays, they also spoke about going to the horses on another visit. We all then walked back to the play area where William and [REDACTED] continued to play together. We all walked back to Mr Tarbett's car for William to collect his sweets etc. Mr Tarbett showed William a video camera which he said he would bring to next visit to take video of William

All happily said goodbye to each other. Visit ended at 5 pm.

William happily chatted to me, said he had enjoyed the visit and about going to the zoo and the horses on other visit. William then went back to chatting about seeing [REDACTED] tomorrow with Phillip.

I gave Mr Tarbett £1.60 for bus fares for today's visit.

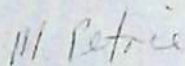
Event: Contact Visit

[REDACTED] Heather Russell, Phillip McGill, Sandra Duke and Janet Sherrard.

Child & Family Psychiatry: monitoring progress and looking at strategies for developing change.

- being vigilant
- being aware that William cannot stop himself from being aroused by certain actions.
- being able to recognise that William needs watching in order to stop/prevent him from doing things which he cannot control himself from doing.
- the one thing that will stop him from developing as an offender, is to provide him with appropriate relationships to which he becomes attached and policing his behaviour.
- William's carer is the person who has to 'swallow [REDACTED] the frustration of not having more to do/to be done/to prevent/to mend what has been broken.
- having appropriate sorts of excitement.
- [REDACTED]
- understand them.
- that work about the sexual activity that happened might bring back/reinforce the excitement.
- there are aspects of him which are the nice 7 boy, which we want to increase.
- at his stage William needs to be told not to and isn't yet ready for "why not?"
- [REDACTED]
- it is about sexualised behaviour.
- that William knows the thrill of sex, and reads this into seeing others kiss etc.
- that he does 'turn people off' but needs people to stick with him.
- concern about William's 'learning' in lots of areas, are these linked?
- a youngster with global learning difficulties, we can't fix learning difficulties.
- even if we learn the details of William's difficulties/abilities, this may not affect the management of the difficulties.

Conclusion

That [REDACTED] can ask for another meeting to review where things are at, a meeting will not otherwise be arranged.
