We then went to a café where Linda became more communicative, although more about herself, [redacted] walking, [redacted] being a handful, she did ask William how he was what had he been doing but he was not forthcoming, I tried to encourage him, Linda did not pursue this, going back to speaking about herself.

I gave Linda £2 for travel expenses for today's visit.

Both happily said goodbye to each other, Linda gave William £5.

William was chatty on the return journey, he was pleased his mum had signed his consent form, he said he will use the money she gave him to get his ear pierced. William was pleased to see [redacted] telling him his mum signed his consent form, asking him where the others were.

12 12 02 Contact Visit With Dad

I collected William from his after school club, William was quite stropky in his attitude, he was very blas'e about fighting at school, home. William asked me if I knew if his dad would be there today, I told him I did not know. I asked William if he was going to ask his dad why he did not come the last time. William said he wanted to know but did not want to ask his dad, he wanted me to do this.

Mr Tarbett arrived shortly after us, he had [redacted] with him, William asked him why he had [redacted] with him to be told he always has him. William got himself ready and went on the ice, when he did come over beside us it was more about getting something to eat and drink, there was very little conversation between William and his dad, and what there was, was instigated by William, mainly about him fighting. I tried to encourage discussion about why Mr Tarbett did not attend contact visit last month, William made out that it was me who wanted to know this. Mr Tarbett said he had not been told of the visit. There was very little interest shown from William towards [redacted].

Mr Tarbett gave William £100 and a small hand held television for his Christmas.

All happily said goodbye to each other.

I gave Mr Tarbett £2 for travel expenses for today's visit.

William was a bit calmer on the return journey making more reasonable conversation, although he was a bit stropky with [redacted].

I collected William from the [redacted], William was in good humour, he was chatty about things in general, said he was looking forward to seeing [redacted] he wasn't sure about when he was seeing [redacted] he very briefly mentioned not seeing his mum.

[redacted] and William were pleased to see each other, they exchanged Christmas presents but did not open them, keeping them to open on Christmas morning. While out and during lunch conversation started of well about how they were things in general, they also talked about contact with birth parents, mum not coming to see them, William said "bad mum", both spoke about both parents failing visits. [redacted] told William she only sees their dad twice a year and their mum about four times a year. William seemed surprised at this. Both then started to get silly, blaming / hitting each other. They carried on like this when we returned [redacted] home, encouraging [redacted] to join in.

Happily said goodbye to each other.

William was again fine on the return journey, chatting about things in general. He was pleased to see [redacted].

[REDACTED] advised William went in a mood because he wasn't getting to go ice skating with [REDACTED] even although he had been told the ice rink was not open, he had said to [REDACTED] he did not want to go to the pictures. [REDACTED] told me she was not in the room when she heard the boys arguing, when she went into the room William and [REDACTED] were fighting, William would not take any of the blame, he blamed every one else, he was cheeky to [REDACTED] would not do as he was told, go to his room (all of the others did) he said to [REDACTED] what are you going to do about it. I suggested to William he could think about what had happened and he could talk to [REDACTED] and apologise to her when he returns, he did not comment.

William was fine with me in the car, we discussed very briefly what had happened with the others. William and I talked about not being able to go ice skating as the ice rink was closed. William again acted immaturely while walking up the road to the car and in the car, [REDACTED] again commenting on this. There did not seem to be any conversation between them about birth parents, family.

Both happily said goodbye to each other. William was fine on the return journey, he slept a bit of the way.

William was happy to see [REDACTED] and the boys.

I collected William from his carers, William presented as settled and happy, good relationship with [REDACTED]. William was chatty with me about how he was, what he has been doing. William asked if I knew if his mum would be there, I told him I had seen her yesterday and she said she would be there.

Linda and [REDACTED] were waiting for us at the Bowling Alley, William was pleased to see them, all greeted each other happily. The visit went very well, there was good humour, Linda and William played two games of bowling which they enjoyed, even although at times it was interrupted by [REDACTED]. Linda did talk to William about her situation while I spent time with [REDACTED]. Linda and William talked to me about this when I went over beside them, Linda said she had told William she was back living in Dundee as her partner had died and she hasn't been coping very well, reason for her not attending contact visits. William said he knew about this as [REDACTED] had mentioned it to him. William spent most of the visit on the ice, when he did come over beside us it was to ask his dad for money for something to eat. William did not make any conversation with his dad or Mr Tarbett with him even although I tried several times to encourage conversation. On one occasion when William got something to eat he went over to another table and chatted to the boy there. Towards the end of the visit William came over to the table with one of his skates off, I asked him what had happened, he said he went over his ankle, I asked him if he needed to get it seen to, he said no. Mr Tarbett mumbled something to William but did not show any real concern.

William then said to his dad the shop was now open could they go there which they did. Mr Tarbett bought William a magazine and a wallet, he also put money in wallet.

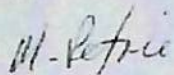

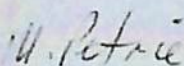

I collected William from his after school club, William was chatty about what he has been doing, especially playing ice hockey, although at times he was a little bit cheeky about different things.

Mr Tarbett arrived with [REDACTED] there was also another female in the car with them. William did not know who she was, I suggested he ask his dad, which he did not do.

William acknowledged his dad [REDACTED] and they him, we all went into the Ice Rink, William went off to the toilets to get himself changed, when he came out William and I went over to the café where the others were, William put his skates on and went on the ice, with very little conversation having taking place. I asked who the other female was before William went off, I was told her name was [REDACTED] and she was a friend of [REDACTED], she was there as she was taking [REDACTED] to the pictures after the contact visit. [REDACTED] also went on the ice although William did not go around all of the time with them. William came over to us a couple of times asking for something to eat and drink, asking his dad if he would buy him a hockey stick and would he give him more money to go towards his new skates, Mr. Tarbett gave William a bit of a laugh about this, also looking over at me. William did not seem impressed or ask anything about this. William went back on to the ice, he also went to the shop which Mr Tarbett noticed and said he would go and see him there.

When the female and I were on our own she volunteered the following information to me, she told me her name was [REDACTED] and she had been in care from a young age, she had been taken from her parents as they could not look after her, she said she was not looked after any better while she was in care than she was with her parents and she now has mental health problems. She named several social workers asking if I knew them.

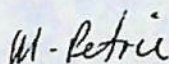

William was chatty on the journey to Cupar to see ██████████ he said he was looking forward to seeing ██████████. William did not seem bothered about what had happened between him and ██████████. Both ██████████ and William were pleased to see each other. I left William with ██████████ and his carers returning for William to return him home. This visit according to all went very well.

William was chatty on the return journey, asking when he will see ██████████ again, William went on to talk about what he would be doing during the rest of the school holidays.

William was pleased to see everyone, he then went off to make arrangements with his friend.

I collected William from his after school club, William was looking well although he seemed to be in a bit of a mood, he offered very little conversation but did speak when I spoke to him. William did say he was wanting new ice skates and he was going to ask his dad for them.

Mr Tarbett met us at the ice rink, William and Mr Tarbett acknowledged each other, Mr Tarbett told us he would have to leave sharp as he had to meet with his QC at 5.30pm in the town, due to him being in court next week. William did not ask anything, he went off to get himself changed. While he was away Mr Tarbett said to me he has not met this QC before and that his solicitor had told him William, [REDACTED] are to be in court. I told him I did not think this was the case as they had not been cited, he said he will see his solicitor about this as he had told him they were to be in court.

William came over beside us to put his skates on, he made out he was having problems with his skates, saying they did not fit him properly, Mr Tarbett gave him a help to get them on. William then asked his dad if he would buy him new skates, then asked for money towards new skates, Mr Tarbett did not answer him, William went off to go on the ice, he did not present as having a problem skating. William was not away long when he came back and asked his dad again about new skates or money, again getting no reply about this. After several times of this Mr Tarbett asked William if the shop here had the skates he wanted. William told him no as he did not want to get the skates from here as there is a shop he would get money back from because he plays ice hockey. William asked his dad for money so he could go and buy something to eat, he gave him money, William bought sweets from the machines. Mr Tarbett did go over to the shop with William, when he came back Mr Tarbett commented on the price of the skates, he asked me to go to the shop with him to have a look which I did. William had gone back on the ice, Mr Tarbett called him over just before 5pm telling him he was going soon. William went to the toilet with Mr Tarbett before we left the ice rink, when they came out Mr Tarbett said to me he had giving William £40.

I gave Mr Tarbett £1.80 for petrol expenses for today's visit.

Both happily said goodbye to each other.

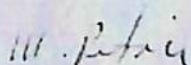
William offered very little conversation on the return journey, he said he did not like living away out where he does, I told him I had never heard him say that before and what had made him change his mind, he said because he wouldn't be going out tonight as it was raining, he wouldn't be doing anything. I told him the rain has not stopped him seeing his friends in the past as [REDACTED] have to take him to his friends or his friends parents have to do this and this has never been a problem before, he agreed. William did then become a bit more communicative.

William was not his usual self today, was in a bit of a mood, there was very little conversation.

I spoke to [REDACTED] about today's visit. [REDACTED] advised William had been saying for days his dad would be buying him new ice skates when he saw him today even although [REDACTED] had tried to tell William this would maybe not happen.

Two women with two children came over to us while sitting in the café in the ice rink and asked if William was our grandson, Mr Tarbett told them he was his son. One of the women alleged William had kicked her son while he and William were in the toilets early on and they had been looking for him to ask him about this. William agreed he had been in the toilet but denied having kicked the boy.

Mr Tarbett told me Linda Robertson had accused him of telephoning social work in Perth making allegations about her being drunk with her children, he denied he had done this. Mr Tarbett went on to say he has seen Linda several times under the influence of alcohol, she leaves the children with her mother then when under the influence of alcohol telephones her mother and accuses her mother of having not been able to look after her as a child. Mr Tarbett said it is true what Linda said about her mother as Linda was in care as a child, and Linda should not be leaving the children with her mother as her mother does not keep very well, what if anything happened to her while she had the children.

I collected William from the [REDACTED] at 11am to undertake the longstanding plan to visit his previous homes, both with his parents and with foster carers.

William was extremely keen to do this work, but before we left we looked at the date and address list I had made, and identified where we would be visiting, with [REDACTED] looking on. The plan was to photograph all his homes and schools in Dundee and the locality. I explained to William that at this point we could not visit the Hostels in Elgin, Tullibody and Dunfermline where he had also stayed with his mother as a baby when she needed to leave the family home.

First visit was to a former foster carer near Cupar Angus. William was gung ho that we identified the house and photographed it, even though the carers no longer live there. He kept repeating how exciting this was, and how much he was enjoying it.

We lunched at Tesco's, on the Kingsway, where we accidentally met, and sat next to, [REDACTED] and his daughter. James was a respite carer for William when he lived with the [REDACTED]. William and [REDACTED] recognised each other and there was a lot of discussion, mostly centring on the fate of the various animals.

The next visit was to [REDACTED]. William had last seen [REDACTED] about a year ago when [REDACTED] stayed with them for respite. When we got into the car he was insistent that I telephone [REDACTED] who was delighted to hear us and agreed we could meet. [REDACTED] invited us in, so we were able to see photographs of her sons, and meet the dog, Paddy. [REDACTED] also had numerous photos of William which she gave us. There was a lot of positive reminiscing and William was clearly delighted to see her. [REDACTED] was unfortunately at work. We took photos of William and [REDACTED] and the dog together outside the house.

We then drove into town to photograph Bonnet Hill Court, where Mr Tarbett still lives. William became quite quiet and contemplative, but also began to bombard me with questions about his parents' relationship and the age at which he had lived in the various locations, and with whom.

We drove to Monifieth to photograph the home of the [REDACTED] who had looked after both [REDACTED] and William. On the way there, William started to talk about his time in care. He said that he was a great [REDACTED] (sic) and queried why he had not been able to stay there. We talked a little about the aggressive relationship between him and [REDACTED] at that time, and why it had not been possible for [REDACTED] to look after both of them in the same placement.

William went on to say that he did not want to go and photograph Finlaggan Terrace as he 'hated' living with [REDACTED]. He then immediately went on to say that he wanted to stay with [REDACTED] 'for ever and ever'. I reassured William that the [REDACTED] wanted him to stay, and it was good that he also wanted to do so.

I then asked William why he hated being at [REDACTED]. He replied 'because of [REDACTED]'. I asked him what [REDACTED] did that he didn't like. He said that he hit the children and swore at them. I asked him which children he hit. He said [REDACTED]. I asked whether [REDACTED] social worker knew this. William said yes, that was why [REDACTED] left. I asked him whether [REDACTED] had ever hit anyone, to which he replied 'no'.

I felt that William wished to say a lot more, but I did not push him to do so.

William perked up when we reached the [REDACTED]'s home. He was insistent that we ring the bell. Eventually Mr [REDACTED] answered the door. He had been upstairs in bed because of illness. He recognised William, whom he had not seen for five years, and seemed delighted to see him. He said he wanted us to come back when his family was home and he was better as they would want to see him. He gave me their telephone number and we agreed I would ring to arrange something.

We then drove to Whitfield to find the house where William was born. It was clear that the house had been demolished, so we photographed the area where it had been and similar houses nearby. Again, William became quiet and contemplative and seemed convinced that his father was in the locality. We talked a little about William's enduring fear of drunks in Whitfield, and where that fear might have originated.

As we drove toward Fintry, William was adamant that I should drive the long way round in order to avoid Finlaggan Terrace, the [REDACTED] house, even though I told him that they no longer lived there. He was adamant that he did not want to take a photo.

Driving past Caird Park William began to breathe very heavily and lose colour. He said his chest hurt. I was concerned that he might be having a panic attack, hyperventilating, or an asthma attack, so I drove directly to the office at Kirkton. The attack was not serious and quickly disappeared when he sat down, had a drink and met the other workers in the office. I was unsure whether the attack was the consequence of a tiring and emotional day, or of our proximity to the [REDACTED] home and William's statement about events there.

We then went via Teviotdale Avenue and McAlpine School, where we took more photos, back to Auchterhouse. On the drive back William seemed to have regained his composure, although he said he was very tired and that he was going to go straight to sleep when he got home. We talked a little of how the day had brought back sad memories and happy memories, and although it was enjoyable, was also very tiring and emotional. We also planned how we would put all the information we had gathered into his lifestory book in a couple of weeks time.

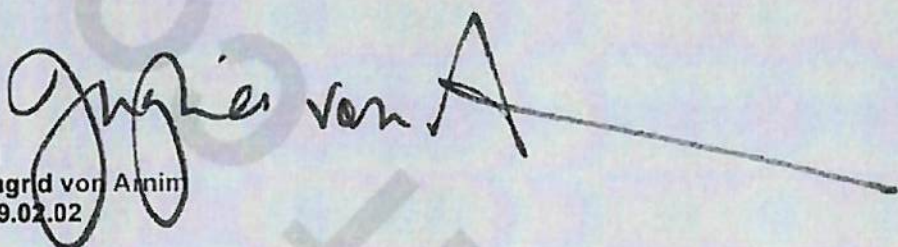
6.30pm Telephone call to [REDACTED]

- a) Ann Partington should be informed by memo and copy of detail record

William was happy to see [REDACTED] telling him about the visit.

I collected William from school, William was full of chat and confident, he was keen to talk about what he has been doing especially playing ice hockey. Mr Tarbett met us at the ice rink, both were pleased to see each other. William looked more to me to help him with his skates, clothes. William came off the ice a few times to chat with us, mainly about ice skating / hockey. Mr Tarbett asked William where the hat was that he had bought him the last time he saw him, William looked bewildered, he said he could not remember his dad buying him a hat. Mr Tarbett told William he has been seeing his mum and she has been phoning him quite a lot, she was going to come to see him today so she could see him skating as she has never seen him do this, William did not say anything. One of the times when William came over to us he spoke about having been in the shop asking his dad if he would go to the shop with him as he saw other ice hockey figures he would like. Mr Tarbett went to the shop with William, buying him another two ice hockey figures, he also gave him money. Both happily said goodbye to each other arranging to meet at the ice rink next visit. I gave Mr Tarbett £1.80 for petrol expenses for today's visit. William chatted happily on return journey about living with [REDACTED] and the boys, ice skating / hockey.

3 Record of Discussion of the Review

TASKS SET AT THE LAST REVIEW MEETING HELD ON 18.06.02

- 1 William to stay with Mr and Mrs [REDACTED] as the Children's Panel has determined and continue to attend school. Ongoing.
- 2 William will continue to receive dental treatment as required. Ongoing.
- 3 Review Officer will speak with Rosemary Crowe about extra help with maths. This matter was raised with Rosemary. However, unfortunately Rosemary is on long term sick leave and Mr Chalmers will raise the matter with her replacement who has recently started.
- 4 Work with Ms von Arnim on lifestory will continue. This continues.
- 5 William will be supported in his interests such as ice hockey, football. William's interests have changed somewhat but everyone is still committed to helping him with his interests.
- 6 Planned contact will continue as arranged with family members. See below for details.
- 7 The Department will offer Mr Tarbett and Ms Robertson the opportunity to discuss the concerns about unplanned contact with William. This has not happened as neither have been in contact with the Department.

PLACEMENT

[REDACTED] in describing the placement, said that, since the last review, William's behaviour within the family has been much more difficult. Incidents of defiance, cheekiness, swearing and occasional sporadic violence have increased. It is clear William is quite unsettled about something but his ability to translate that into language is very limited.

It was noted that another placement had been made with the [REDACTED] and that their commitment to this young man until at least June next year seems to have had an unsettling effect on William and made him feel less secure within the family. More worrying of late has been William's tendency to act out in the community amongst his friends in terms of aggressive and violent behaviour. [REDACTED] said that initially the pattern between William and [REDACTED] the new placement, had been quite difficult to manage but this has settled down to an almost acceptable level of bickering and competition for adult attention.

The [REDACTED] reinforced the strategies that they have had in the past with William in terms of talking to him about his unsettled behaviour and, where appropriate, using sanctions such as time-out. In a wider presentation, William's situation has not changed very much as he is seen by adults as co-operative, friendly and an inquisitive young man. However, once this surface presentation has been explored, they see William can show difficult tendencies and interaction.

All this increased behavioural difficulties on the part of William has been a stress on the placement and left the [REDACTED] feeling drained. Consequently, Brenda Kidd is arranging for respite care for a weekend for William and will be looking at respite care for [REDACTED] on a similar basis. She has arranged for William to meet a family who are offering a weekend respite care and this will take place shortly. William asked about the family and it was suggested to him that, along with [REDACTED] he should draw-up a list of questions he wants to ask the family when he visits so that he knows more about them before he actually goes there. Brenda asked that it be noted that regular respite care be built in as part of William's care plan. Obviously it would be in his best interests for this respite care to take place with the same carers on a regular basis. However, this will depend on the demands of these carers for placements of other children. William is to meet his potential respite carers on Monday 09.12.02.

HEALTH

William has been in good health since the last review. The only difficulty has been dental work. It was noted William has lost 4 or 5 baby teeth and this is seen as encouraging. He is now 11 years of age and is only recently starting to loose these teeth. There are no major concerns about any aspect of his health.

EDUCATION

There has recently been a parents night at Auchterhouse Primary School which [REDACTED] attended.

3 Record of Discussion of the Review - Cont

William's composite class of Primary 6/7 consists of 16 boys and 3 girls. William, himself does not find it a happy experience as he felt his teacher was "mooney". He is, however, looking forward to leaving primary school and going on to secondary school. [REDACTED] said that Auchterhouse Primary School have already been in touch with Monifieth High his catchment school and arrangements are in hand for guidance staff to be made aware of William's difficulties. She also feels that William will need classroom assistance because of his learning difficulties.

The outcome of the meeting of the school is that his individual educational plan which is in place will be continued until the end of his time at Auchterhouse Primary and elements will be carried forward as appropriate to Monifieth High School.

In conclusion [REDACTED] felt that William's behavioural difficulties may well have manifested themselves in a bigger setting where as Auchterhouse Primary with their limited numbers have been able to assist William and keep a perspective on these difficulties which has helped William and encouraged William to apply himself to his studies. He still finds mathematics difficult but his reading skills and writing skills have improved significantly since the last review. Attendance at Auchterhouse Primary School has assisted William because they have been consistent in their approach and in their work with him in making sure that William's education moves forward and that they are appropriate in their approach to William and his difficulties.

CONTACT

Maureen Petrie described contact between William and his mother to be better than that between William and Mr Tarbett. Since the last Review, she has missed one contact but the quality of interaction between William and his mother has not been of a very high level.

Contact between William and Mr Tarbett has taken place mostly at the ice rink while William has been on the ice enjoying himself and maybe even spending time with his friends and coming back to his father. Interaction has consisted mainly of William asking his father for money for the shop or asking his father to go to the shop to get him something from it. Mr Tarbett did not appear at the last contact and William, himself, had not expected him to be there.

William has seen his brother [REDACTED] on two occasions since the last review and one more contact is planned before Christmas. His contact with [REDACTED] has been less but William had enjoyed his trip to Crieff to collect his sister and had enjoyed being in her company although he was wearied a little before the end of time. The level of contact between William and his parents may have to be reassessed if such things which have happened recently continues to be the case.

OTHER ISSUES

[REDACTED] wished it to be recorded that, despite the difficult nature of the placement at the moment, she has had good support from all involvement in the Social Work Department and the communication with her has been of a very good quality.

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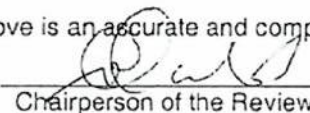
