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Narrative

Police Referral received 7.5.14 - [REDACTED] Admin

Lee Johnstone contacted police stating that he had ongoing problems in his head and was "cracking up". Lee was not suicidal and had not self harmed at all. Lee Johnstone was rambling on at contact centre and seemed very confused.

It would appear that Lee Johnstone has only in the last few days been released from hospital after possibly overdosing, he was admitted to an induced coma in Ayr hospital ICU and was only released on Friday 2nd May 2014.

Police attended and spoke with Lee Johnstone about 0400 hours on the morning of the 04/05/2014. It was noted he was very confused and did not know his own basic details and did not know where he was. Lee Johnstone appeared very wandered and did not know whose house he was in (House was infact his mothers and he lives there.)

Lee Johnstone stated that he had not taken any illegal substances or others form of drugs, nearly that he had consumed about 1/4 bottle of vodka that afternoon however did not really have a recollection of this. He was asking officers repeated questions and appeared to be in a very confused state.

Male was conveyed to Ayr hospital for assesement by hospital staff who decided to keep him in for observations in an attempt to establish the cause of his confused demenour.

It would appear that he may suffer from epilepsey and has suffered a seizure, which Hospital staff state can result in partial memory loss and confussion.

Lee Johnstone does like to have a drink and could possibly suffer seizures due to possible withdrawal
